

Team From Maritimes to Be Made A Not Stronger

RUSSELL, N.B. (CP)—A plan to give the Maritimes provinces their own representation ever in Memorial Cup hockey was announced today by Barry W. Yexya of Sussex, president of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association.

The proposal calls for four junior A teams in the Maritimes—one each from Cape Breton, Nova Scotia, Miramichi and New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island—to be made up of the best junior players in the respective sections.

A meeting of interested parties in southern New Brunswick will be held this Sunday.

Arrangements are also being made for senior teams to improve their play in the Allan Cup play, Yexya said.

Prior to Memorial Cup play, the four junior teams would declare

a Maritime Junior A championship team either through playoff games or a round robin schedule.

The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association has made concessions to the Maritime branch in an effort to arouse interest in junior hockey. Provision has been made for the provincial teams and players of junior age who have been playing senior, intermediate or junior hockey may compete with the junior all-stars, provided they are permitted to their clubs, with whom they may continue to play after elimination of their section.

Yexya said efforts will be made to arrange interprovincial play-downs between the teams leading players to the Allan Cup.

CAN AD PLAYERS

The team earning the right to represent the Maritimes against

the Ottawa and district champions may add six players from within the branch before entering Memorial Cup competition.

Yexya said it is hoped to organize two temporary teams in New Brunswick, one for the north and one for the south. These teams would meet in a series and the provincial team would be selected from the best.

In the senior series for the Allan Cup, the Maritime champions also will be drawn against the Ottawa winners. As with the juniors, six players from within the branch may be added to strengthen the Maritime representatives.

"We never had time to quit scraping," was the way it was put by Lou Creekmur as the veteran offensive guard strilled into the field offices Monday for his biggest payday.

"Every game was a home-grown cardiac for this team," said the big lineman who just finished his eight professional campaign. "No one got us anything it was a long, tough road for us. We had it easy, that was the difference Sunday."
