Quebec offers To Aid P.E.I. Industry Survey

The province of Quebec has offered to assist Prince Edward Island in carrying out investigations that could lead to the establishment of new industry in this province.

Provincial research director, Hartwell Daley, said yesterday he had discussed the matter in Quebec City during the past few days with Quebec's trade and industry commissioner, Louis Marchand.

While discussions on assistance in industrial development from Quebec are relatively new, it is expected that the matter will be cemented by top officials of both governments within a few weeks.

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"Our industrial needs are different from Quebec, which are highly industrialized while we are not — and in cases where plants in Quebec manufacture any of the 200 items that could be made here, the government will act as intermediary and assist us to locate small plants here."

During the weekend, Mr. Daley met with Henri Dubold, Quebec's director of agricultural rehabilitation and development program. "We examined ways," said Mr. Daley, "in which our two provinces can work together under ARDA. Quebec is going to use the Gaspé peninsula as one of their major pilot areas under the program—Gaspé's development problems are similar to ours, involving small farms."

"Research and resource development material of this province has been made available to Quebec," Mr. Daley said. "Research in this province's studies have been made available to us."

Mr. Daley also met with René Tremblay, who is expected to be appointed minister of agriculture for Eastern Canada. "Our discussions related to rural development," said Mr. Daley, "and I made available some of our research material to Mr. Tremblay for study."

Commenting on ARDA advances in this province, Mr. Daley said the proposed economic development survey of West Prince County was enlarged to include all of Prince County as well as a portion of Queens — the Rustico area. "The machinery has been set up," said Mr. Daley, "and a plan outlining the subjects to be covered is just about completed and ready for cabinet approval."

Mr. Daley said that as soon as the Prince County survey is completed a similar survey will be carried out in Kings county. "The studies," he said, "will result in a master plan for economic development of these areas. A great deal of emphasis will be placed on agriculture."

Dr. E. L. Ross, director of the Sanatorium Board of Manitoba, says tuberculosis mortality in the province declined to 2.9 per 100,000 population last year from 42.7 per 100,000 in 1945.

Lloyd Penna Sanderson, New Perth, charged with driving while his license was cancelled.

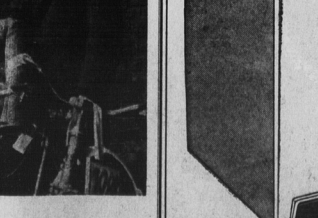
