# Gov't. Suggested As Site For Jail

A plan for solving the congestion problem in Queens County Jail is the building of a prison farm on an island. It has been suggested that Governor Island in Hillsborough Bay be purchased for the purpose. There is nothing revolutionary in the idea, nor is there anything particularly new in it. The late Senator Walter Jones, while premier of this province, once suggested he had in mind obtaining Boughton Island for this purpose. At that time, Premier Jones said: "I am tired of drunks stopping me in the Square to ask for money. If they are put on the island with a farm to look after, they would have to be hungry."

Other governments of the past have also toyed with the idea. The Prisoners' Act, 1940, states in section 13 of chapter 49. "The Lieutenant-Governor in Council may, by proclamation published in the Gazette, establish a jail farm or industrial institution for one or more of the counties of the Province."
