

Archie Moore KO's Tony Anthony, Seventh Round

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Youth made a bold and a gallant stand in the end it was light weight champion Archie Moore who held on to his world title with a cannonade of shots that brought a knockout in the seventh round Friday night over young Tony Anthony of New York.

California rules it goes as a knockout. Moore weighed in right on the nose just before noon at 175, and it took more than 20 minutes overtime to pare off an extra quarter of a pound.

Anthony, showing remarkable recuperative powers, answered the bell for the seventh looking amazingly fresh and certainly full of fight. He started a flurry of blows to Archie's head, which Archie for the most part took on his elbows, arms and the top of his head.

Suddenly Archie drove a hard left hook deep into Tony's stomach. That may have been the blow that brought on the eventual end.

Moore was well ahead on points after the opening rounds that brought an action-packed sixth round when he started Tony on the way out with a rapid fire left-right-left to the head and stomach. Tony went into full retreat. Moore must have hit him 20 times as Tony went from one neutral corner to his own and then sidled off down the ring ropes.

Finally Anthony was beaten into a stooped position and the referee stepped backwards on the seat of his pants and rolled over. Timekeeper Jack Smith got to six as the bell sounded and prolonged the match.

Under the rules if the New York state athletic commission, a boxer who fails to report a bribe offer is subject to suspension.

Robinson said "fellows would approach me but after a while they would know I wasn't interested and they would go away."
