FOOTBALL IN ENGLAND.

The English football season is closed and the Westminster Gazette publishes its annual "blotter bill." The "blotter" shows that during the season there were twenty deaths on the football field and that over one hundred and fifty legs, arms and collar-bones were broken, besides many cases of concussion of the brain and sprains, paralysis, spinal meningitis and hundreds of minor casualties.

SEA FISHING.

According to recent advices from St. John's, N.B., the seal fishing season just ended has been one of the most successful on record. Two thirds of the steamers engaged in it did remarkably well, and the remainder made enough to pay expenses. The value of the catch is estimated at about \$500,000. This will prove a wonderful benefit in the way of bringing about a recovery of the colony from the recent commercial disaster.

A quiet, but important, event took place at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Poole, Montague Street, last evening, when their second daughter, Mary Helen (Minnie) was united in marriage to Mr. E. L. Head, of Milford, Ont., manager of the dairy station at Crapaud. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. W. H. Spencer, only the near relatives of the bride being present. DR. BUCHANAN.

A Halifax correspondent of Progress reports for "poor Buchanan," who is now in Sing Sing fighting desperately for his life, and says: "Hundreds of young men remember him as their schoolmate of eighteen years ago at Albert street school, where J. T. Melish was principal." The correspondent adds: "Buchanan had married the daughter of an esteemed resident of Brunswick street, and seeing that he could not successfully fight the board he agreed to go to Edinburgh and study, so that he might pass the required examinations. It was with money received from the kind-hearted father-in-law that he and his wife crossed the Atlantic for Scotland's capital. Study there was a failure, but he was in earnest in drawing on his wife's father for large sums of money, and having a 'good time,' he got to the end of his tether and came to New York. Not long after a divorce was obtained from his wife, and 'Bucky,' as he was called at school in Halifax, married a woman of questionable reputation possessed of a few thousand dollars. She died, and it is on the charge of murdering her that Buchanan was sentenced to death. Only a month later he was back in Halifax, and re-married his divorced wife. He forgot his cunning that time, for it was his undue haste that proved his ruin. One of the newspapers of this city wrote up Buchanan's marriage adventure and the story was telegraphed to the New York World. That paper saw in the affair a possible sensation, and started on a detective enterprise which soon landed Buchanan in prison, and has finally secured his execution."
