

Modern Car Sales, Service Offered In New Jenking Bldg.

Marking his 30th year in the automobile business, W. R. Jenkins announces the grand opening of the most modern automotive sales and service building east of Montreal today.

The new show rooms of W. R. Jenkins Ltd. are located on the 8th Floor of the new building at the corner of Prince Edward and St. Peter's Roads just outside the Charlottetown city limits and offer customers the use of extensive parking facilities, the services of a top sales staff and factory trained employees.

WIDE SPAN

The building is the first of its kind in Prince Edward Island, the structure is Butler, pre-fabricated metal with a completely clear span eliminating all upright columns in the interior. The dimensions are 70 feet wide by 100 feet deep by 17 feet high. The showroom area is 24 by 40 feet. Adjoining are the manager's office and the general offices. The floors are concrete throughout with vinyl plastic floor tile in the offices.

ULTRA MODERN

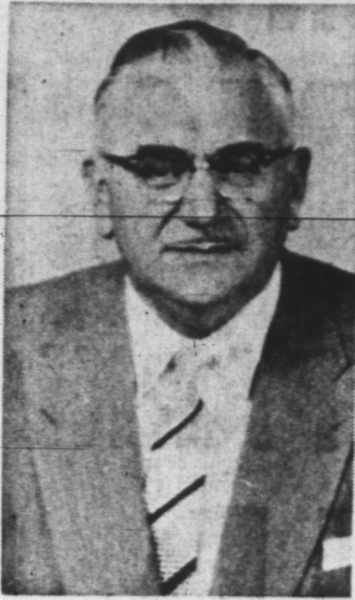
Next to the show room is an ultra modern parts department approximately 36 by 30 and wash rooms for the customers and the staff.

Above the offices and parts department on the main floor is a secondary parts department and stockroom.

The service bay is a customer dream. Taking up 65 by 70 feet of the floor area it accommodates 12 vehicles and offers the best in working conditions.

The showroom and offices offer the latest in recessed lighting set in an acoustic tile ceiling and surrounded by birch plywood walls. Mahogany plywood walls are a feature of the manager's office.

The showroom is almost com-

pletely surrounded by plate glass windows. The front of the structure is faced with Roman brick with the area above the plate glass windows being covered with 'abestos' flex board. The remaining walls are concrete block.

HOUSES BANK

The building is also occupied by the Parkdale bank of the Bank of Montreal.

The new building is heated by a forced hot water system with an oil fired furnace. The service bays are heated with unit blower heaters.

Thermolite rubber faced insulation applied directly between galvanized roof sheathing and steel beams assures that the structure will be completely fire-proof.

Construction of the new automotive sales and service building, which was necessitated by increased sales of cars, was started by County Construction about the first of May.

Saving Bond Issue Launched By Gov't.

OTTAWA (CP)—The government Thursday launched its 1959 Canada savings bond issue, offering Canadians record interest rates in a bid to attract their savings.

The bonds, on sale Oct. 13, are tailored to encourage buyers to keep them until they mature nine years from now.

This has been done in two ways: by annual interest coupons scaled upwards from four per cent in the first year to a record five per cent in each of the final six years, and by offering a non-taxable bonus of three per cent on bonds held the full nine years. A premium has never before been offered on Canada savings bonds.

This will mean an average interest return of 4.98 per cent on bonds held to maturity Nov. 1, 1968. It compares with an average of 4.19 per cent in the 1958 issue and the previous record yield of 4.46 in 1957.

ATTRACTIVE ISSUE

Finance Minister Fleming, in a statement announcing the terms, said the interest yield, a record in the 14-year history of savings bonds, is "very attractive in relation to market issues of a comparable maturity, having regard for the privilege of redemption at par."

The first year's interest coupon will be at four per cent, the second year at 4 1/2 per cent, the third at 4 3/4 per cent, and the remaining six years at five per cent. It is the first time a Canada savings bond has carried a five-per-cent interest coupon.

Thursday's announcement follows a successful securities issue of \$500,000,000 earlier this week to repay bonds maturing Oct. 1. This was in four types of short-term securities with interest yields ranging from 6.33 to 6.80 per cent. But that issue is not comparable to the new Canada savings

bond.

The savings bonds can be cashed in at any time for their full face value plus accrued interest—a feature designed for the average citizen. The bonds sold earlier this week are so-called "market issues" which can't be redeemed before maturity and whose value fluctuates on the bond market.

ON SALE OCT. 13

The Canada savings bonds, dated Nov. 1, will be on sale between Oct. 13 and Nov. 14.

There are two other new features in this year's issue. The maximum amount of bonds in this issue that any one person can hold has been doubled to \$20,000. And for the first time the bonds may be registered in the name of the estate of a dead person, or legally constituted executor, trustee or administrator of an estate.
