TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.
An Exciting Discussion.]

TORONTO, Oct. 12.
At an exciting session of the Victoria Board of Regents held yesterday, the Federationists proposed to call a special session of the general conference if the opposing litigants would consent to accept its decisions. The anti-federationists fiercely opposed the proposal, but a resolution recommending it was carried by a large majority, the counter proposition which was voted down was to suspend all action in the form of federation until the next regular general conference in 1891.

This bold challenge of the federationists put their opponents in an awkward corner, for the main contention of the latter has always been that the promoters of Federation have misinterpreted the will of the general conference. The responsibility of further obstruction and trouble is now thrown upon the opponents of the movement.
The duty of calling a special meeting of the General Conference devolves on a standing committee of conference, which, at a late hour last night, considered the recommendation of the board of regents and decided to issue a call for such special session if the plaintiffs to the restraining suit against the board of regents give the required guarantee, which is not considered likely.

THE LASH.
TRURO, N. S., Oct. 13.
For the first time in the history of Colchester the lash was applied to-day in the county jail at Truro. Hitch, the culprit, was sentenced at the recent October session of the Supreme Court to imprisonment for one year, and receive 50 lashes, 25 within ten days, and the balance shortly before the expiration of his term of imprisonment. The crime so punished was one of indecent assault upon a six-year-old child named Morrison, at Economy.

THE CANDY MYSTERY.
ST. JOHN, Oct. 13.
The investigation into the cause of Mrs. McRae's death was continued on Saturday evening, when several witnesses were examined. D. C. Clinch, banker, swore that on the day of M. D. Donald's arrest, the latter drew money on deposit, and Detective Ring testified to finding two boxes in Barker's establishment with blue bottles, like the one received by Mrs. Haw.

CHARGES FORMULATED.
OTTAWA, Oct. 13.
The complaints of the German Consul at Victoria and Montreal, in reference to Admiral Henge's conduct have been received by the Government and forwarded to the Imperial authorities without comment. The statements that the Government passed an order-in-council censuring the Admiral is untrue.

FOUL PLAY.
CHICAGO, Oct. 13.
There is a big sensation here over the discovery of a systematic and widespread attempt to bribe the jurors in the Cronin case. Six arrests have been made.
