## Erroll Nicholson Wins Local Club Jr. Golf Championship

### Even Death Doesn't Break Bond Binding Cleghorn Bros

MONTREAL (CP)—Even death could not break for long the bonds between the brothers Cleghorn—the famed Sprague and Odie.

Hockey idols of yesterday, Sprague and Odie now are joined in death. Odie was found dead in bed Saturday, a few hours before he was to attend Sprague's funeral.

Sprague, 66, the "hard rock" and Odie, 65, the "dude," brought to the National Hockey League a color, nerve and skill that fans still talk about—and will for many years.

Recalling the boisterous, rough-house days of the NHL, many of the old-timers spoke of the brother-temmates with tears as Sprague, the victim of a traffic accident, was laid to rest Saturday.

On Tuesday, funeral services will be held in the same church for Odie, the First Presbyterian Church, at 2 p.m. EDT.

A touching feature of the lifelong loyalty between the two was that Sprague, a battling 170 pounds, was Johnny-on-the-spot countless times to take the part of his 160-pound "kid brother."

"They were almost like twins," said Leo Dandurand, veteran sportsman and long-time friend of the pair.

Recognized as one of the finest stickhandlers hockey has seen, Odie, a centre and right-winger later became an outstanding coach and referee. He was credited with inventing the system of using three forward lines to crack the opposition, now an integral part of the NHL.

TWO WERE CONTRASTS  
A fastidious dresser and polished performer, Odie was the opposite in many respects to his explosive brother who loved practical jokes of a juicy kind.

Once, when the brothers were leaving Vancouver for the east by train, Sprague placed a dead pigeon among his brother's silk shirts—a thing that Odie didn't discover until the prairies, when the pigeon was very ripe.

Asked a few years ago how many "major" hockey fights he was in, Sprague, a defenceman, countered:

## Fangid Cops 11th British Grand Prix

SILVERSTONE, England (AP)—World driving champion Juan Manuel Fangio of Argentina won a bitter duel with England's Sterling Moss Saturday to capture the 11th British Grand Prix.

Fangio, piloting a Ferrari, slipped ahead of Moss after the Englishman made the second of the three pit stops that cost him the race. Moss led for three-quarters of the way before Fangio edged ahead. The Argentine sped to 303 miles in an elapsed time of two hours, 59.4 minutes.

Moss, driving a Maserati, pushed his car off the track for the last time with a split fuel tank on the 97th lap.

Britain's Peter Collins, also driving a Ferrari, finished second. Third-place honors went to France's Jean Behra in a Maserati.

Fangio's victory, the first since he won the Argentine Grand Prix in January, left him one point behind Collins in the world championship. Collins, who took over the car of a teammate, the Marquis de Portago, was forced to share his second place points with the Portuguese nobleman.
