## G. MacMillan Dies At 82

George C. MacMillan died June 11 at his home in New Dominion in his 83rd year.

Born at Rice Point he was the son of the late Donald MacMillan and spent most of his adult life at Doctham, Mass., where he had been employed with the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad for more than 50 years. Since his retirement in 1952 he lived at Westville in New Dominion.

During the First Great War he served with the American Army in France.

The late Mr. MacMillan was a member of the Oddfellows Lodge.

He is survived by his wife, the former Amy Stewart, a daughter of the late Captain T. A. Stewart of New Dominion; one son, Donald S., and one daughter, Lorna Elizabeth Williams.

There are also eight grandchildren. One sister, Mrs. Ida Carson of Quincy, Massachusetts also survives.

Resting at the MacLean funeral home the funeral will be held Monday from his late residence at 2.30.

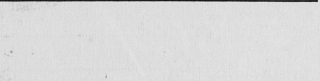

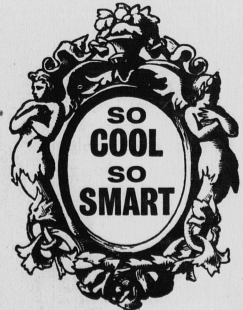
