Bombers Top Eskies 23-7 To Capture WIFU Finals

WINNIPEG (CP) — Winnipeg Blue Bombers striking early and taking advantage of every opportunity, belted Edmonton Eskimos 23-7 Saturday afternoon in the deciding game of the Western football final on snow-covered Winnipeg Stadium.

Bombers now meet Hamilton Tiger-Cats next Saturday in Vancouver in a repeat performance of the two clubs in the Grey Cup final. Hamilton won the Canadian title last year with a 32-7 triumph.

A crowd of 13,960 witnessed the rugged contest in which a crashing Winnipeg line contained the Eskimos ground attack and generally hurried the passing game

of quarterback Don Getty. The alert Bombers also made key recoveries of three of four Edmonton fumbles and intercepted two passes.

It marked the second straight year Bombers had upset the Eskimos in a three-game final at Edmonton had won the Grey Cup in the three previous years.

FORCED THIRD GAME

Bombers, easy winners of the league schedule, downed the Eskimos 30-7 in the first game at Edmonton a week earlier, but Sam Lyle's crew bounced back to take the second contest at Winnipeg Wednesday night by the same score, forcing the saw-off game.

Bruising John Varone, import fullback, plunged for two touch-

downs for Bombers while quarterback Jim Van Pelt booted two converts, a field goal and two singles. Fullback Charlie Shepard, restricted to kicking duties due to a hip injury, added three singles.

All-star quarterback Jackie Parker, running from a half position scored Edmonton's touchdown on a 29-yard, pass-and-run play from Getty. Joe Mobra converted.

Winnipeg went for a converted touchdown shortly after the opening kickoff, then added a field goal to take a 10-0 lead in the first quarter. They boosted their margin to 18-0 at the half and 21-0 at three-quarter time.

HAMILTON TIGER-CATS and Winnipeg Blue Bombers left no doubt Saturday afternoon as to their superiority and their right to represent the East and West in the Grey Cup game next Saturday in Vancouver.

Both Hamilton and Winnipeg scored decisive victories over Ottawa and Edmonton. The Roughriders' defeat was not unexpected. Indeed many had thought that the Trimble-coached Tiger-Cats would give the men of Frank Clair a more resounding wallop. However, the Eskimos-Bombers clash was such that you hardly knew who should emerge the winner. Each had won a game in the best of three series and by identical scores of 30-7. Nobody was quite sure what was supposed to occur Saturday, nobody but the Blue Bombers.

AFTER WATCHING Wednesday night's game when Edmonton swamped the Winnipeggers, you would be inclined to go along with the boys from Alberta. That first victory of the Bombers was pushed into the background and Eskimos naturally became the team of your choice.

However the Winnipeggers had learned their lesson on Wednesday. They know now that this Edmonton club could hurt you badly if you gave them the chance. The Bombers had done just that Wednesday and a 30-7 lacing was the result. One more such display and there would be no trip to Vancouver for Bud Grant and his charges. These were the cold bare facts.

WELL WINNIPEG left no doubt in anyone's mind. The Bombers were by far the better team and they gave the Eskimos little chance to get started. Grant's team showed everyone why it had finished on top of the heap in the regular W. I. P. U. schedule. They proved that those four straight wins over Edmonton in league play were no flukes but just what should have happened.

Now the obstacle is Hamilton. But, brother what an obstacle. Here is a hurdle that western champions are going to find really tough to get over. They looked weak against the Tiger-Cats in 1957 and there seems no reason why we can expect them to be any better match in 1958.

Perhaps the Blue Bombers will throw a terrific surprise and upset the Big Four champions. But we're not anticipating any such startling occurrence.

MILWAUKEE BRAVES' Don McMahon is a pitcher with an unusual complaint. Don doesn't get enough work to keep him happy.

In these days of the long ball and the frequent use of pinch hitters, the average relief hurler has to pitch almost every day. But with McMahon it's different. He doesn't pitch often enough to keep sharp.

The reason for so much inactivity for Don lies in the fact that the Braves hurlers were so good in 1958 that relievers didn't get much chance. This past season the Milwaukee pitchers turned out 72 complete games. When the starting corps do a job like this there isn't much work left for the boys in the bullpen.

NO OTHER STAFF in the National League came close to that figure, and no other relief pitcher got nearly as much rest as McMahon.

"I got too much rest," moaned the jumbo righthander. "I pitched in only 38 games all year. The season before that I didn't join the club till the last week in June and I pitched in 32 games."

It was after the All-Star game that work became scarce for Mr. McMahon. Jay Pizarro and Willey all did nobly and Spahn and Burdette were like the Warren and Lew of old. One time Don sat on the bench for nine days, another time for eight. After the Braves clinched the pennant on September 21, McMahon didn't get into action for 13 days.

DON MAINTAINS that this lack of work as the cause of his ineffectiveness when he appeared in the third game of the world series. In 1957 he hurled five scoreless innings in three appearances. In 1958 he proved no problem at all to the New York Yankees.

National League teams will try desperately to help McMahon solve his problem of inactivity next year. They will endeavour to get Milwaukee moundsmen out of there in a hurry in order that Don may be able to make his way more frequently to the pitcher's mound.

Those National Leaguers would love to oblige.

MANAGER FRED HANEY doesn't go out of his way to throw bouquets at his great pitcher, Lew Burdette. Haney readily admits the capabilities of Lew but he doesn't hide the fact that Burdette could be of much greater service to his club if he had the disposition.

Says Haney: "Maybe the front office should sign Lew Burdette in December and order him to report in January. The guy never shows up on time and is always holding out. He's not in shape when the season begins. If he was, he'd be a 25-game winner."

A TORONTO SPORTSWRITER has come out with high praise for Canadiens' defenceman, Tom Johnson. He predicts that Tom was bound to emerge from the obscurity of perennial all-star Doug Harvey's shadow.

"If he played for any other club in the NHL, Tom would be on the first all-star team right now," says his Canadiens' coach Toe Blake. And the Toronto scribe adds "If he played against other NHL clubs like he does against Leafs, Johnson might even make part of the voting populace forget how to spell Harvey."

SPANIARD TOPS FIELD Irish Golfers Capture Canada Cup Competition

MEXICO CITY (AP)—A 25-foot putt from the fringe of the green on the third extra hole gave dark-horse Angel Miguel of Spain a playoff victory over Ireland's Harry Bradshaw Sunday after the Irish had clinched the Canada Cup team golf title.

Bradshaw and Christy O'Connor had put together a two-man aggregate of 379 in the Canada Cup team event.

Playing in the same tense four-hole at the end of the field, Miguel and Bradshaw closed with two-under-par 70s for a 72-hole score of 286, beating Flory van Donck of Belgium by one stroke. Then they set out on a sudden-death elimination.

They halved the first two holes with a pair of spectacular recovery shots by the Irishman and then proceeded to the 188-yard par three.

BIRDIE DEUCE Bradshaw putted within 18 inches of the cup but Miguel sank for a birdie duce and victory as a large part of the record crowd of 12,000 cheered wildly.

Playing individually after the withdrawal of sore-backed Sam Snead, Ben Hogan trudged in with a two-over par 291.

Hogan tied with South Africa's Gary Player for seventh place. Par for the 7,216-yard Club de Golf Mexico course is 36-36-72.

Bradshaw's four-round total of 286, plus the 293 registered by his partner, Christy O'Connor, gave Ireland a three-stroke advantage over Spain's golfing brothers, Angel and Sebastian Miguel, in the team battle. Sebastian Miguel was even par for Sunday's final round. He had a 72 hole score of 296.

Ti-Cats Can't Be Any Tougher

WINNIPEG (CP) — Coach Bud Grant of Winnipeg Blue Bombers said after Saturday's victory in the Western Interprovincial Football Union final that the Hamilton Tiger-Cats "can't be any tougher than Edmonton."

The Bombers will meet Hamilton in the Grey Cup game in Vancouver next week. They will leave here for Vancouver Monday.

Grant said he thought his team came out "real good" as far as injuries were concerned and "should be 100 per cent" for the Grey Cup game.

"We felt we had to run against them," Grant said of the Eskimos. Despite the snow on the field "we used a lot of wide stuff."
