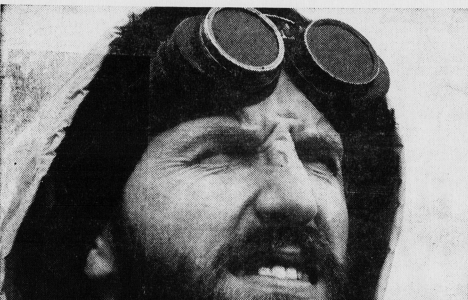

Nfld. Native Wins Ch'ship

TORONTO (CP) — Alex Oakley, 35, of Ottawa won the mile Ontario walking championship Saturday with a time of one hour, 17 minutes and eight seconds, seven seconds better than his closest rival.

A native of St. John's, Nfld., Oakley placed ninth in the 20,000 kilometre walk at the 1960 Rome Olympics and won a gold medal for Canada for the same distance at the 1962 Pan-American Games in Brazil.

ANGELS TOP GENATORS; COLTS DO IN REDS 6-3

The favored Los Angeles Angels and New York Yankees began defence of their league titles today as the real of baseball's major leagues follow the lead of Washington and Cincinnati to complete the two-day opening program.

Sandy Koufax, brilliant last season with his 28 victories and World Series efforts, will try to get the Dodgers off on the right foot against the challenging St. Louis Cardinals at Dodger Stadium.

In Monday's season opener the Los Angeles Angels scored a one-hit, 40 victory over the Washington Senators and the Houston Colts whipped the Cincinnati Reds 6-3.

In Washington, Ken McBride and Julio Navarre took over the pitching chores from President Johnson for the American League opener.

Washington starter Claude Osteen managed the only Washington hit, a long fly ball that bounced off the centre field fence in the third inning and was good for a double.

The Angels had nine hits, with Joe Adcock leading the way with a double and two singles. They took the lead in the third on Billy Moran's single, a walk to Jim Fregosi and Adcock's double that drove in Moran, stretched it to 2-0 on a single by Adcock and wound it up in the eighth on a triple by catcher Bob Rogers.

In Cincinnati for the National League opener, Ken Johnson held the Reds to five hits and gave the Colts the win over his former teammates with minimum help.

When Johnson faltered in the sixth with two out and one in, Hal Woodeshick replaced him. A two-run homer by Bob Skinner was the end for Johnson.

Two walks, a wild pitch, an error by Chico Ruiz and a run single by veteran Nellie Fox gave the Colts three runs in the fifth.

Houston got three more in the sixth on a single by Rusty Staub and Jim Wynn's home run, followed by singles by Bob Appomonte and John Bateman, a walk to Eddie Kasko and a triple for another tally.

After holding the Colts to two hits through four innings, Cincinnati's Jim Maloney faltered in the fifth and surrendered completely in the sixth.

Maloney, a 23-game winner for the Reds in 1963, fanned two, walked three and allowed seven hits.

The Reds pried only two hits off Johnson in the first eight innings. When he finally
