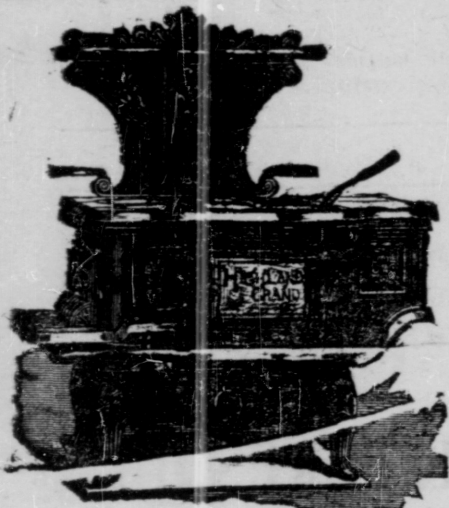

A STEAMSHIP AND COLD STORAGE.

ACCORDING to The Patriot's report, Sir Louis Davies thanked the electors of West Queen's warmly for their handsome majority, etc., and, according to another report, he added in a fit of candor that he could not understand what he had done to merit it! However this may be, it is quite certain that Sir Louis and those who are in the Government party with him owe Prince Edward Island much. We sincerely hope soon to see something in return. A suitable steamship to go from Prince Edward Island to Great Britain direct ought to be supplied this fall. We have heard a great deal about cold storage in the recent campaign; let us now see and feel the benefit of it. There is no Province in Canada to which a proper system of cold storage in ocean steamships would be a greater boon, for we produce almost everything that is usually carried in cold storage. So, Sir Louis, let us first of all see your thanks expressed in this tangible way.

THE STAR.

The Patriot makes an unwarrantable attack upon the Montreal Star. Where, we should like to know, would the Patriot's party be now, if the Montreal Star had not been the means of rousing the government to the necessity of reversing their declared policy and sending a contingent to South Africa. It would have been in the cool shades—but so also would Canada. For its services in that regard, the Star deserves the thanks and support of every loyal Liberal in the country. If Canada now occupies a high place in the affections of an United Empire, the fact is due to the Montreal Star more than to any other agency operating upon Canadian public opinion. Of course it contained some erroneous reports just before the election. At such times the most careful newspaper management in the world cannot prevent the circulation of erroneous reports. Erroneous reports were found in the Patriot; they were also found in THE EXAMINER; we were all in it,—and ought not to denounce, particularly, The Montreal Star.

McKINLEY'S TRIUMPH.

ACCORDING to the latest returns, Mr. McKinley will have 284 votes in the electoral college and Mr. Bryan 163. The republican triumph is as complete as need be. The defeat of Mr. Bryan is ascribed to two things, 1) his intrusion of the free silver question, and (2) his opposition to the Philippine policy. Our astute neighbors now see clearly the folly as well as the dishonesty of the silver fad and they will not again be beguiled by it. Free silver is dead. Moreover they are not opposed to expansion when they stand to gain by it. In the nature of things a growing nation developing great industries and a great commerce must enlarge its sphere of influence and take new responsibilities.
