## Local and Other Items

**THE STANLEY.**—The Stanley left Picton this morning at 6 o'clock. She was reported at the mouth of Georgetown harbor at 1.30.

**NEW CREAMERY.**—A new creamery is being built in North Tryon by the Tryon Creamery company, on the farm of Mr. Luke Woods. The old creamery, located near the Tryon Woollen Mills, will be abandoned and the machinery moved to the new one. So says the Summerside correspondent of the Guardian.

**THE TRAINS.**—The western train due in Charlottetown yesterday afternoon at half-past three did not get here until a quarter past ten last night. This morning the eastern train and the train west of Summerside were both on time. The Summerside train which left here at eight o'clock this morning stuck in a heavy bank near Colville and did not get to North Wiltshire until 2.45. This delayed both the train from Summerside and the mail special from the Caps.

**THE MAIL.**—The mails got over to Cape Traverse yesterday afternoon at half-past three. The mail special joined the regular western train at Emerald Junction and reached town shortly after ten last night. The special left on return shortly afterwards but could not get further than Albany, four miles from Cape Traverse, from which place the mails were driven over in time to catch the boats leaving to-day.

This morning the mail left Tormentine at 7 o'clock and got to Cape Traverse about one. The boats from this side had to put back.

Very little mail matter was brought over yesterday, the sleighs from Aulac failing to connect with the ice-boats.

## "A CELEBRATED CASE."

The celebration of St. Patrick's Day in Charlottetown was brought to a close by the presentation in the Opera House of the drama "A Celebrated Case." This drama consists of four acts and a prologue, and the scenes are laid in the village of Montague, and near Toulon, France. The play is of a most exacting character, and it must be cleverly acted to hold the undivided attention of the audience. It is a production that has taxed the ability of some of the cleverest professionals to properly interpret, and last night's presentation was, under all the circumstances, exceedingly creditable to the lady and gentlemen amateurs taking part as well as to the stage director, Mr. W. The acting of Miss Doyle, Mr. Brown and Mr. McQuillan was especially good. They entered into the spirit of their respective parts, and their work was greatly appreciated. Mr. McQuillan was very funny, and kept the audience in excellent humor. Mr. P. J. Traitor made a fine-looking Duc D'Aubertre, and Mr. Brantley was very good as Viscount De Langet. Little Rosa Ryan had a part in the prologue, and acted it very well indeed. The play was prettily costumed and the stage settings were good. Between the acts Viscount's orchestra rendered some choice Irish airs. Before the close of the performance Mr. D. O'M Reddin, president of the Benevolent Irish Society, on behalf of that organization and the ladies and gentlemen participating in the play, returned thanks for the patronage extended. He pointed out that charity was the great aim and object of the Benevolent Irish Society, under whose auspices the entertainment was given, and showed that this charity was extended to all irrespective of race or religion. Since the cold weather set in, said Mr. Reddin, the society, has expended \$70 in charities such as burials, coal, provisions, etc., and \$125 in sick benefits. Mr. Reddin's remarks were received with applause; and after the National Anthem was played the large audience dispersed, evidently well pleased with the manner in which they had passed the evening at St. Patrick's Day.

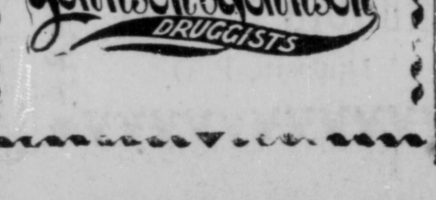
