B. C. Packinghouse Destroyed By Fire

SUMMERLAND, B.C. (CP)—Fire of unknown origin Saturday destroyed a 250,000-box capacity packinghouse in lower Summerland. Damage was estimated at \$750,000.

The fire followed an explosion in the Summerland Co-Operative Growers' Packinghouse on the shores of Lake Okanagan, 10 miles north of Penticton. Jack Towgood, president of the Co-op, said "the plant is a complete loss" and placed the damage at "approximately \$750,000."

G.M. Of Canada Head Enjoys Press Conference

Generally, newspaper men ask questions, look and listen, and make their reports or comments when they back to their typewriters.

This time, however, some of them made their comments on the spot an probably all of them did that rare thing for newspaper men—applauded the man they were interviewing.

The occasion was a sort of farewell press conference in Toronto by William Wecker who, at 65, retires April 1 as president of General Motors of Canada Ltd., and an introduction to Edin H. Walker, who succeeds him.

Mr. Wecker, a tall, spare, quiet-mannered man, has met the press in both good and difficult times, and, despite some reserve, always appeared to speak freely.

But probably never before at a press conference did he seem so relaxed and to enjoy himself so much.

Asked what he planned to do, he said: "Honestly, I don't know. I shall try to organize a routine to take care of some minor personal matters. I hope to play golf, and I am a member of a fishing club on the Ottawa river which I haven't visited in five years."

"I hope to spend part of each year, probably May and June, in England. I love England—I am not sure why, but it must be because of the people there."

When he said in conclusion, "I guess I'll keep busy going round in circles," a newspaper man quipped: "If you do that you're

likely to wind up as a big wheel!"

McIntyre Hood of the Times-Gazette, Oshawa, Ont., home of General Motors, speaking as the newspaper man present who had probably seen most of Mr. Wecker, said:

"MISS HIS PERSONALITY Mr. Wecker will miss his fine personality which never seems to get ruffled."

"He has guided General Motors through its most important years—the post-war adjustment and the expansion which followed. In community affairs, in a quiet self-effacing way he has been outstanding. We have come to regard him as a citizen of sterling worth as well as a sterling industrialist."

Both Mr. Wecker and Mr. Walker were presidents of McKinnon Industries Ltd., General Motors subsidiary at St. Catharines, Ont., before moving to Oshawa, and a newspaper man asked, half-jocularly:

"What is in the air at St. Catharines?"

Mr. Wecker, commenting that he didn't wish "to pin a lily" on his own lapel, said the only thing he could think of was that General Motors at Oshawa did a wider range of automotive manufacturing than most American plants. Accordingly, the manufacturing experience gained at McKinnon's, a big parts manufacturer, was of great value in Oshawa.

Declines Chip Away Most Of Week's NY Stock Market Gains

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market last week capped the longest string of daily rises it has enjoyed in 1957 but they were small ones.

Declines at the end of the week chipped away enough of the earlier advances so that the market wound up only slightly ahead of the previous week. Trading volume was sub-par.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up 40 cents to \$173.30.

The Israeli withdrawal was looked upon as a big step toward the achievement of more stable conditions in the Middle East. The stock market took heart from this and advanced cautiously. There was no great buying enthusiasm, however.

Steel Backlog Orders Strong

CLEVELAND (AP)—The United States steel output dropped from 97 to 95 per cent of capacity last week, but Steel Magazine says high backlogs of orders will keep production strong.

Last week's production amounted to 2,400,000 net tons, slightly under the same week last year. The operating rate was the lowest reported by the trade weekly this year.

Steel says the drop was caused by an easing of demand and by a strike at an oxygen producing company which cut off supplies of oxygen used in steel production.

The magazine says the machine tool industry has a six-month backlog of orders, while unfilled orders for steel castings and forgings will take three to four months of production at current rates. Industrial furnaces have a \$100,500,000 order backlog. Grey iron and malleable foundries have about a month's backlog each.

Backlogs for fabricated structural steel are climbing, although shipments are the highest in history. The freight car industry has reduced its backlog about 2,500 cars a month, but it will still take 45 months to catch up, the magazine said.

Journal's composite base price on finished steel held at \$139.51 a net ton, but the composite on scrap fell again from \$52.50 to \$51.67 a gross ton.

Furs Highlight Canada Week In Sunny Miami

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian furs took the spotlight in sunny Miami in a recent special showing.

Thirty-five fur coats, capes and stoles in beaver, mink, ermine, otter and fox were shown to high light "Canada Week" in the Florida winter resort.

Trade department officials here said the purpose of the "week" was to create a better understanding of Canada, its people and its products.

The Canadian consul and trade commissioner in New Orleans initially discussed the idea of a fur show with Miami businessmen.

WIDE CO-OPERATION But the idea mushroomed with the help of the Miami Dade County chamber of commerce and Miami Mayor Randall Christman, who made plans for a whole week of movies, talks, radio and television programs about Canada.

Minister Caught Out On Unparliamentary Limb

OTTAWA (CP)—The Commons opposition caught Resources Minister Lesage out on an unparliamentary limb Tuesday and forced him to climb down.

Mr. Lesage withdrew for re-writing a minor bill dealing with the National Museum after Donald Fleming (PC-Toronto Eglinton) called on the chair to rule it out of order.

The bill proposed for splitting the museum into two national museums of natural and human history. That was the only change specified in a permissive resolution adopted earlier this session.

The resolution required because the bill involved spending federal funds.

But the measure as printed also would have empowered Mr. Lesage to establish "such other national museums as he considers necessary or desirable."

Mr. Fleming said the government couldn't go beyond the terms of the original resolution preceding the bill. It was "an unwarranted departure from constitutional practice."

Members gave final passage to a bill to increase by one-third the total amount the Canadian Farm Loan Corporation may borrow from the federal treasury for operating funds.

The Commons also approved the principle of a measure to continue government control powers over export of strategic materials. It would extend for three years to July 31, 1960, the Export and Import Permits Act under which the government licenses shipments to Communist countries and controls import of products under federal price support, such as butter.

During the hour reserved for private members' bills, Hazen Argue (CCF Assiniboia) presented his renewed proposal to limit interest charges to 12 per cent a year on instalment-credit purchases.

The Senate, meanwhile, gave second reading—approval in principle—to a bill to establish the long-proposed Canada Council.

BACK PLAN The bill, approved earlier by the Commons, would provide the proposed 21-man council with a \$50,000,000 endowment fund to pay salaries and other cultural grants and with a \$50,000,000 fund to make capital grants to universities over a 10-year period.

Senators G. P. Burchill (L—New Brunswick) and Donald Smith (L—Nova Scotia) supported the bill.

Senator Burchill said
