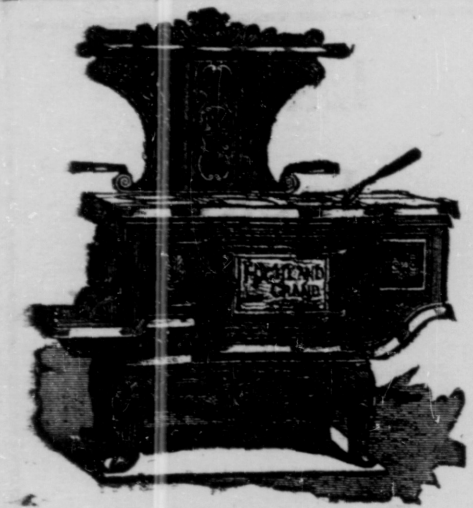

MR. FOSTER WAS RIGHT.

(St. John Sun.)

A little over a year ago a banquet was given to Mr. Foster at the Royal Hotel in this city. War had been declared against Britain by President Kruger, and the governments of all the other colonies had offered troops for the defence of the empire. The Canadian government alone held back, though only a year and a half before the premier of Canada had moved through the streets of London in the jubilee procession at the head of the colonial representatives. When called upon to place Canada in line with the rest of the empire Sir Wilfrid refused. He prepared a statement for the government press declaring that the government could do nothing and would do nothing of the kind. He asserted falsely that the militia of Canada could not be used save in the defence of the dominion, which was not then threatened. Immediately following this statement Er. Tarte declared that for his part he would never consent to the offer of troops, and demanded through his paper "What have we to do with the affairs of South Africa?"

It was in these circumstances that Mr. Foster made his banquet speech. We take from the report given by the Sun at the time Mr. Foster's words in reference to the duty and the sentiment of Canada: "To-day, when the sound of the Boer guns and the flash of Boer swords aimed at British instintions threaten the old motherland with war, New Zealand sends her contingent--(great cheers)--and sends it promptly. The New South Wales Lancers marched through London yesterday. (Renewed cheering). Why was there so great a demonstration in the streets of London? Because it was felt that Britain's children were true to her, ready to prove it by blood if need be as well as by lip service. (Great cheering) And where was the premier colony? A voice--"Where was Tarte?" (Hisses).

"Mr. Foster--Where was Canada? Behind? No--not Canada--but the government. (Hear, hear.) The speaker said he would be the last man to make this a political question, but it was not politics. It was a question whether the loyalty and patriotism of this country should be given its proper bent by the action of the government. Mr. Tarte asks: What have we to do with the Transvaal? What have we to do with India or the outlying quarrels of England? Why should we be taxed for these? But, said Mr. Foster, we have to do with these, and we will. (Tremendous cheering.) The sentiment of this country will have its will. If Mr. Tarte's sentiments are the sentiments of a cabinet minister, it is time there was one cabinet minister less. (cheering.) And, said Mr. Foster, I know the sentiments of the French fellow subjects, for they will be a long the first, if a call is made, to guard the empire that has been a very mother to them. (Cheers.) Though they love the old countr of their fathers--though the old language is sweeter to them than any other--and why should it be--yet they are Canadians and rit sh subjects and will reprobate sentiment like that. (Long continued applause)."

A French-Canadian was present at the banquet, and we quote the language of Mr. Bergeron: "But Tarte with all his authority lacked discreteness, and he had just said something that touched the heart of every Canadian. Loyal Quebec was ashamed of the master of the administration at this juncture. This man, who at the last election prompted the canvas in Quebec that to return Protestant Tupper to power would be to send their sons with rifles to fight abroad has gone to Laurier and told him he must not send a Canadian contingent to the Transvaal." "But, continued Mr Bergeron, "these men do not voice the sentiments of my compatriots. Quebec is as loyal to the British flag as any province in Canada. I know it. History proves it."

Mr. Foster was right. The time came when Sir Wilfrid gave in to public sentiment and when Mr. Tarte surrendered though on terms which he proclaimed abroad, not in this country only, but in France. Mr. Tarte stipulated that the act should not be a precedent and should not be repeated. Then he went about the world saying that he had succeeded in getting this statement recorded in the order-in council.

But Mr. Foster was right, and Sir Wilfrid Laurier was wrong. Mr. Foster said that the sentiment of the country would have its way, and it did. Sir Wilfrid said that the government could not and would not send the troops. The government could and did. It had to.
