16 Reasons For Re-Electing MACNAUGHT 16

Here are some of the benefits that have come to Prince County from the Liberal Government at Ottawa. They are the direct results of J. Watson MacNaught's representations in the House of Commons during the past four years. He has actively supported all of them. With him Prince County comes first.

- 1. Expenditures of over 16 million dollars on the RCAF Station at Summerside as well as large defense contracts have meant increased employment and much revenue to the people of this area and the County generally.
2. Approximately 1,189,356 dollars spent since 1949 in 31 localities by the Department of Public Works on new construction and extensions to public buildings, repairs, dredging and improvements. 4. Age reduced from 70 to 65 for eligibility through a means test for Old Age Assistance. In Prince County 210 citizens have already qualified and the amount of the Federal Government's fifty per cent participation is \$25,500.
5. Family Allowance cheques also introduced by the Liberal Government go each month to 5100 families and bring \$968,000 annually to Prince County. During the past four years, they have brought \$3,730,000 to the county.
6. Freight assistance continued on feed grains effect great savings for our farmers every year. Price support for butter and eggs have been brought into effect. Hog premiums are paid.

ON MONDAY NEXT FOR CONTINUED PROSPERITY RE-ELECT MacNAUGHT (During the past four years approximately 88 million dollars has come to the Island from Ottawa. J. Watson MacNaught has secured for Prince County its share.)

- 7. Markets retained for our fish and other primary products through international trade agreements. Maintenance of these markets is due to Liberal Government adherence to and insistence on low tariffs and freer trade policies.
8. Increased expenditures for fisheries research and exploration.
9. Deep sea fishermen allowed to deduct cost of food, lodging and some items of gear for income tax purposes.
10. Low premium insurance plan for fisherman's boats and lobster traps. This is important new legislation. Its provisions will be expanded.
11. Loans to fishermen who suffered severe storm damage to lobster traps.
12. Reduction and removal of duty on gear and equipment used by farmers and fishermen.
13. Assistance to farmers exhibitions, grants for potato warehouse construction, payments to producers of fox pelts; assistance in procuring farm fertilizers.
14. Improvement of Post Office facilities.
15. Large grants for provision of new hospitals at Summerside and Alberton.
16. Assistance to War Veterans, Unemployment Insurance, Mothers Allowances and other welfare benefits continue and will continue to be paid.
