

3 Juniors May Make Canadiens

OTTAWA (CP)—At least three members of the Memorial Cup finalists—Regina Pats and Ottawa-Hull Canadiens—have a good chance of making their parent Montreal Canadiens roster in the National Hockey League next year.

The big prospects of the two clubs, who meet in the fourth game of the final tonight, are centres Ralph Backstrom and Billy Carter of the Baby Habs and Billy Hicke of Regina.

"One or more have a good chance of making the grade," De Wilson, chief western scout for the Stanley Cup champions, said Thursday.

He said the majority of the 10 players with Pats and Junior Canadiens who are playing their last year of junior hockey will be at the parent club's training camp next fall.

He said the players who don't make it probably will wind up with clubs in the Quebec, Western or American leagues.

"I feel junior players need a year or more in these leagues before making the big jump," he said.

Backstrom, a native of Kirkland Lake, Ont., is giving the best chance of the junior prospects because of his play with the Baby Habs and tryouts with the parent club last winter.

He probably will patrol a left wing if he makes the grade as the Canadiens are well stocked with centres like Jean Beliveau, Henri (Pocket Rocket) Richard, Phil Goyette and Don Marshall.

TOP SCORERS
Backstrom and Carter, a native of Cornwall, Ont., have monopolized the Junior Canadiens scoring, each getting five goals of the 13 in the three games.

Hicke, a native of Regina, has picked up four of the Pats' eight goals, including a hat trick in the opener which is the only game the western champions have won.

The other Regina players ending their junior hockey careers are Joe Lungehamer, Jerry Kolb, John Palenstein and Bill Lecaine. Junior Habs' graduating players besides Carter and Backstrom are Claude Richard, brother of Henri and Maurice (Rocket) Richard, John Annable and Terry Gray.

Martinez Vows To Win Title

BOSTON (AP)—Vince Martinez vowed Thursday to end years of knocking at the door by defeating Virgil Akins for the world's welterweight championship June 6 in St. Louis.

Martinez beamed confidence after his arrival in Boston for a 10-round meeting with former lightweight contender Armand Savoie of Montreal next Tuesday.

"I don't take anyone lightly, but naturally I expect to beat Savoie and then go on and whip Akins," the 28-year-old Martinez said.

A stylish boxer, Martinez said he plans to be more aggressive than usual but won't take unnecessary chances against Akins in their bout for the title vacated by Carmen Basilio.

"I'm not going to let him catch me the way he did Tony DeMarco and Isaac Logart," Martinez said. "There have been too many years of knocking at the door for me to blow this chance."

Arch Moore Fights Tonight

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—Ancient Archie Moore, aching for another shot at the heavyweight title but preferring to defend his own light heavyweight crown against Ray Robinson, goes after his 11th straight victory tonight.

Archie, 41 by his own count but probably nearer 45, meets Will Besmanoff of Germany in a 10-round televised scrap.

For the well-travelled Moore, it will be his 200th fight according to the record book. The light heavyweight king admits there are other fights which even he can't recall.

"But I understand I can establish a record by knocking out Besmanoff," said Archie.
The record book shows Moore and the late Young Stribling each knocked out 126 opponents. Besmanoff numbers 14 knockouts among his 37 victories. He has lost 10 and fought seven draws.

Sixteen Colts Are Named For Saturday's Big Classic

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—Sixteen three-year-old colts, headed by the stretch-running Silky Sullivan, fast-stopping Tim Tam, and temperamental Jewel's Reward, Thursday were named for the 84th running of the \$125,000-added Kentucky Derby Saturday.

Other horses entered were Flamingo, Gone Fishin', Lincoln Road, Benedicto, Chance It Tony, Martins Rullah, Jet's Alibi, Ebony Pearl, Nouredic, A Dragon Killer, Warren G., Can Trust and Red Hot Pistol.

Silky Sullivan, a notorious slow starter, set the pace to the entry box. He was the first horse to be entered.

Nadir, who last fall won the world's richest race, the \$277,000 Garden State Stakes, will be sent to New York to prepare for a possible appearance in the Preakness at Baltimore May 17 and the Belmont Stakes June 7. Nadir was fourth in Tuesday's Derby Trial, won by Tim Tam, and suffered a couple of minor leg cuts.

If the weatherman co-operates, this 84th Derby could draw more than 100,000 for the biggest crowd in its history due to the presence of Silky Sullivan. Silky, the California-slowpoke who trails far behind, then turns on the power in the final half-mile, is one of the most talked-about colts ever to start in the Derby.

Tim Tam was listed as the early 2-to-1 choice to give Calumet its seventh Derby. Iron Liege last May won No. 6 Tim Tam races this year, the Flamingo at Hialeah and the Florida Derby at Gulfstream.

Odds on Silky, who won the Santa Anita Derby but hasn't tangled with such colts as Tim Tam and Jewel's Reward, were 5 to 2.

Jewel's Reward who was generally recognized as the two-year-old champ of 1957, was third choice at 7-to-2. Jewel's Reward finished first in the Flamingo but was disqualified for bumping Tim Tam. Later Mrs. Graham's colt won the Wood Memorial at Jamaica.

Chicago Cubs, assisted by a couple of rookies, took over first place in the National League Thursday, half a game ahead of San Francisco Giants who regained the top Wednesday.

Rookie Ray Semproch of Philadelphia Phillies shutout the Giants 7-0 with a seven-hitter.

Rookie Johnny Goryl's homer in the ninth broke a 2-2 tie and gave the Cubs a 3-2 victory over Milwaukee Braves.

In the other day game Boston Red Sox defeated Kansas City Athletics 7-6.

Semproch scored his first victory as a starting major league pitcher. The game, at San Francisco, was a scoreless tie until the Phillies broke lose with four runs in the seventh inning off loser Ruben Gomez, one of them Ted Kazanski's first homer of the season. Gomez had allowed only two scratch singles in the first six innings.

FIRST APPEARANCE
The triumph went to the fourth Cub pitcher, Moe Drabowsky, making his first appearance this season after a six-month hitch in the U.S. Army. Drabowsky, who played in the Halifax and District League, won 13 and lost 15 for the Cubs last season before going into the army. Lee Walls had a perfect day at bat with a homer and two singles. Walls now leads the NL with nine homers and 17 runs batted in.

Boston ended with a split in its two game series with Kansas City at Boston. Prior to a two-run outburst in the ninth inning the Sox had left 11 runners stranded. Homers by Hal Smith and Bob Cerv accounted for five Kansas City runs. Cerv now has seven for the season.

Mahovlich Gets Rookie Award

MONTREAL (CP)—Frank Mahovlich of Toronto Maple Leafs won the National Hockey League's rookie award for the 1957-58 season, nosing out Bobby Hull of Chicago Black Hawks by four points in the voting for the Calder Memorial Trophy.

The league announced Thursday that the 20-year-old Toronto forward, who piled up a big lead in the mid-season voting, finished with 120 points to Hull's 116.

As the winner, Mahovlich receives \$1,000 from the league.
The voting was by hockey writers, broadcasters and telecasters in the six NHL cities. Points were awarded on a 3-1-1 basis for first, second and third choices.

Phil Goyette of Montreal Canadiens, with only one point in the first-half voting, was given 42 in the second half and placed third. Mahovlich had 82 points of a possible 90 in the first-half-season voting and Hull 39. The 19-year-old forward rolled up 77 points in the second half to Mahovlich's 38.

Mahovlich did his heavy scoring in the first half, with 15 goals and seven assists for 22 points. In the second half he scored only five goals and nine assists.

Elbow Injury Sidelines Score




