This will be the last opportunity our people will have to hear this eloquent defender of Christianity during his present visit to the Island.

THE second match between the English and Australian cricket teams was begun on Tuesday. In the first innings England scored 363, and Australia 121. Australia was obliged to follow on, and had scored 12 in the second inning when the play was stopped with one wicket down. The match was resumed next day.

WE see by reference to our Supreme Court reports that our young friend, Reuben D. Stavert, of Summerside, was yesterday admitted an Attorney of the Supreme Court of this Island. Mr. Stavert studied for five years in the office of Mr. Edward J. Hodgson, Q. C., and in addition spent a term at Harvard University. The examiners' report of Mr. Stavert's examination shows that they found him well qualified to practice as an Attorney, and we have no doubt but that he will succeed in his profession.

IMPORTANT AUCTION SALE.—That large four-story brick building which is to be sold as advertised on the 29th inst., offers a rare chance for safe investment. It is universally admitted to be in every way well adapted for a hotel, such as is loudly called for by commercial men and the general public. But apart from its central position as a hotel, the stores, cellars and warehouses of the building could be rented, and at lowest rates would yield clear of taxes annually about \$1500. In any case a capitalist purchasing this new and substantial brick building would be sure to realize a handsome profit on his investment.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, a well known vagrant—Oweny Smith—about ten years of age, was arraigned for stealing a silver cruet stand from the residence of Mr. Wm. Knight, Grafton St., and his mother was charged with being an accomplice. The youngster pleaded guilty, but the mother denied that she knew anything about the stand being stolen until after the arrival of the policeman at her house. She told a long, round-about story, made up of American silver, Gospel Army and the trials and tribulations attendant upon having to work hard for one's living, and in conclusion assured His Honor that she had neither "hand, nor part" in the larceny of the stand. His Honor then informed the mother that as the evidence against her was not very strong, he would have to discharge her, but if ever she appeared before him again she might expect to be severely dealt with. He then sentenced Oweny to three months' imprisonment. A little girl for ill-using a little boy was the next case. The plaintiff said that the defendant struck him and called him hard names. This charge the defendant denied. The mothers of each, who were present in court, then entered into a discussion of the affair, and it was some little time before order could be restored. His Honor dismissed the case and lectured both parents and children on the evil of their ways.

A vagrant who had no sooner been released from jail than he proceeded to make himself obnoxious to the residents of the North end of the city, said that if he were released he would leave the Island for St. John, N. B., where he belonged and to which place a gentleman had offered to pay his passage. His Honor ordered a policeman to accompany the vagrant to the gentleman referred to, and see how much truth there was in the matter. A man whose cows had been running at large on the public highway was cautioned and discharged.

CONFERRING THE BARETTA.

QUEBEC OUTDOES ITSELF.

QUEBEC, July 22.

Our ancient capital outdid itself in the eclat with which it celebrated the conferring of the Barettia upon His Eminence Cardinal Pascherat. Large crowds were in the city, and the day was observed as a general holiday.

The streets through which the procession passed were densely packed with a sweltering mass of humanity. It required all the exertions of the troopers of the cavalry school corps to make a passage for the procession.

The city presented a fine appearance, but the route of the procession being short, the decorations were mostly centered in one spot. The procession, while not a large one, was remarkably representative. Members of the Legislative Assembly and of the House of Commons, Judges, Senators, members of the City Council, and members of the Privy Council, took part in it.

His Eminence the Cardinal, accompanied by Mgr. O'Brien, the Papal messenger, rode in a carriage drawn by four horses and was frequently cheered. At the City Hall the children gathered there, sang a hymn and presented bouquets of flowers.

Arrived at the alcove erected in front of the Basilica, the procession, hitherto a civil demonstration, became transferred into a religious ceremonial.

The Basilica was prettily decorated, and was crowded to the very doors. His Lordship Bishop Gravel, of Nicolet, preached, and referred to, the honor conferred upon Canada. After some further ceremony, Mgr. O'Brien read the proclamation appointing the Cardinal, and after his address handed the pontifical order to place the barettia upon the head of His Eminence, to Bishop Clinch of Toronto. This done, the service concluded with a grand Te Deum.

The Cardinal, wearing a barettia, then addressed the crowd outside from a temporary platform, and dispensed the pontifical blessing amid the salvos of artillery.

In the afternoon His Eminence entertained his guests at a banquet.

A YOUTHFUL MURDERER.

A Mother's Indiscretion.

ST. JOHN, July 22.

News has been received of a sensational murder by the four-year-old son of Richard Tufts. The victim is the ten months' old baby of E. D. Saratt. Some days ago Mrs. Saratt met Tufts on a bridge near her house, and while teasing him, said that he could not throw the baby, which she had on her arm, into the water. The boy immediately reached for the child. She then repeated the remark and left. On Monday she went out for a short time, and upon returning found her baby gone. The remark she had made to the boy Tufts at once occurred to her, and upon a search being made the baby was found in the brook dead. It is surmised that Tufts went to the house, took the baby out of its crib and threw it into the brook. He denies the crime.

An inquest was held by the coroner yesterday, and a verdict of "wilful murder" returned against Tufts. The authorities are at a loss what to do with the youthful murderer, who is too young to be arrested or held responsible.

A Libel Suit Unsuccessful.

DIOBY, July 22.

In the case of Spiker vs. Adams for \$20,000 damages on account of alleged libels written by the defendant and published in the Halifax Herald and Digby Courier, and growing out of a correspondence published in these papers under the head line "White Slaves in Digby," the prosecution failed to prove the publication, and Judge Weatherbie ordered a verdict for the defendant without giving the case to the jury.

Resignation of the Ministry.

LONDON, July 22.

Gladstone has received from the Queen an acceptance of the resignation of himself and ministers. It is officially announced that Lord Salisbury will be called upon to form a ministry. He will arrive in London to-day.
