His eleven or more red ribbons gave him overall command in a show that had Judge J.C. (Bill) Bennett, Fredericton, N.B. really enthusiastic over the quality.

The cow classes are really strong, he told this paper yesterday. There were several classes of six animals in which there wasn't a single "tail end." 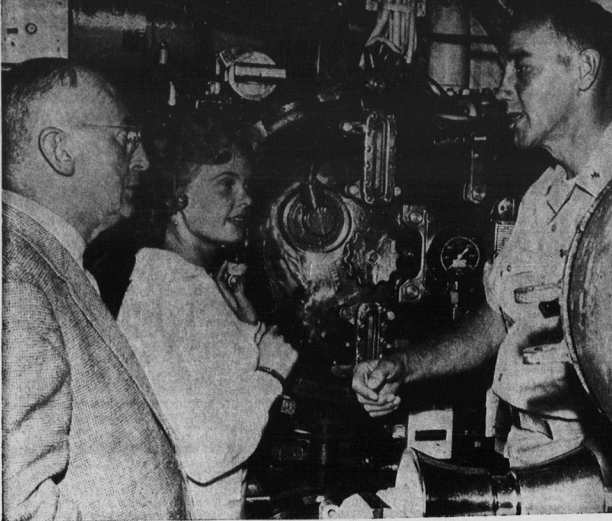
Mr. MacPhee took the junior male champion with Elmweck Good Morning and Alden Gambles had the reserve.

Canadian Economic Aid Under General Review

OTTAWA (CP) — The whole question of Canadian economic aid to underdeveloped countries is under intensive review within the government.

That was External Affairs Minister Martin's only comment on the latest spate of criticism of the Canadian foreign aid effort.

However, unofficially it was reported that an increase in development assistance allocations may be in the offing.

The recent criticisms grew out of a report by the development assistance committee of the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development. It showed that of the 12 OECD members, only Denmark was more parsimonious than Canada last year in the amount of aid given to poorer countries.

Canadian contributions amounted to 14 per cent of the country's gross national product, while Denmark contributed 12 per cent.

By contrast Portugal, at the top of the list, allocated 1.42 per cent and France 1.37 per cent of its GNP and the United States 65 per cent.

In the past, Canadian officials have often been sceptical of the yardsticks used by certain countries to gauge their performance in the foreign aid field.

Thus, comparing one country with another on the basis of figures given by individual governments did not necessarily provide a true picture of each country's aid.

In particular, the officials include that France and Portugal extend administrative costs for present and former colonies in Africa in their aid totals.

Further, loans at going rates of interest figure in the foreign aid reckoning of some countries, while Canadian assistance is in the form of grants, technical aid and capital assistance.

Nevertheless there is strong feeling here, both inside and outside the government, that Canada is not doing enough to help the struggling nations of Africa, Asia and Latin America.

The problem is complicated by Canada's own balance-of-payments position and by its continuing budgetary problems.

Mr. Martin, in opposition, criticized last year's austerity-inspired \$8,500,000 slash in Colombo Plan spending, saying the government of the day should never have allowed drastic retrenchments at home to interfere with vital aid programs abroad.

Shortly after Mr. Martin became external affairs minister, he ordered a thorough review of the whole structure of Canadian foreign aid.

This review is not expected to be completed until perhaps the end of September.

Meanwhile, it is anticipated that a supplementary spending estimate in the fall will restore Colombo Plan allocations to at least the \$20,000,000 a year level. There have been suggestions of a token increase beyond the \$20,000,000 figure.

Wheat Sale To Poland Reported

OTTAWA (CP) — The Canadian wheat board has negotiated a new contract with Poland for sale of 3,200,000 bushels of wheat, the office of Trade Minister Sharp has announced.

The 100,000-ton order is to be shipped from St. Lawrence and Pacific ports between August and November of this year.

Mr. Sharp said the terms are 10 per cent on shipment with the balance to be paid in equal instalments plus interest at 2½ and three years.

This sale is in addition to a contract for a similar amount announced July 18.

Wolfe Monument To Be Replaced

QUEBEC (CP) — The Wolfe monument, shattered by vandals last March, is expected to be replaced this autumn, an official of the Battlefields National Park commission said here.

Exact date has not yet been determined, said Felix Hudon, commission secretary. Contract for the job has been awarded.

Only a stump remained after vandals tied cables around the 25-foot-high marker and tore it down with a truck. They have never been caught.

The statue marks the spot where General James Wolfe died after being told his invading British troops had routed the French garrison during the 1759 battle of the Plains of Abraham.

Cost of the reconstruction is estimated at \$3,500.

Stork Wins Fourth Time

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — Navy Shore Patrolman Tim Marshall raced an old opponent—the stork—and lost for the fourth time in five tries.

Mr. Marshall's fifth child, Robbie Cecilia, was born in the front seat of his car in a hospital parking lot. The mother and child are fine.

"It was the same old deal—we almost made it," said Marshall.

His first child, Leslie 5, was born in a hospital elevator at Corpus Christi, Tex. The second, Yvonne, 4, arrived in the lobby of a Norwalk, Calif., hospital. The third, Timothy, 3, arrived in an ambulance speeding to an Oakland, Calif., hospital.

Marshall, 27, finally won one when his year-old son, Robert, was born. He got his wife, Robbie, 24, to the hospital barely ahead of the stork.

RADIO, TV STAR DIES

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Ed Gardner, 62, known as Archie, wise-cracking bartender on radio and television's "Duffy's Tavern," died Saturday in hospital. Gardner became famous in the 1940s for drawing into the telephone: "Duffy ain't dead," "Duffy ain't dead," "Duffy ain't dead."

He had been in hospital for two weeks with a liver disease. Gardner was married to actress Shirley Booth for 13 years before he had actress Simone Hegeman 21 years ago.

Press, Radio, TV Praised For Handling Tough Issue

TORONTO (CP) — The press, radio, television and movies sometimes display a more Christian spirit than the church in controversial issues, a Anglican Congress said here.

Rev. Malcolm Boyd, chaplain at Wayne State University, Detroit told the world assembly that particularly in current civil rights struggle the mass media of communication "have sought to expose truth about social conditions while the church, as part of an establishment or power complex, has sought to suppress it."

The church must place itself in the public realm of controversy because "the Gospel itself is controversial," he said.

Mr. Boyd also criticized the church for attempting to achieve "a good press" and for seeking to "create public criticism."

He suggested people who see the movie would recognize the aimlessness of a decadent life, giving the church an opportunity to show how Christianity can put meaning into such a life.
