Tenders Being Called For Murray Harbor Wharf Repairs

OTTAWA (Special)—Tenders are being called by the Department of Public Works for wharf repairs at Murray Harbor, Kings County, and will be received up to December 9. The project was approved by the Works Minister following representation by T. J. Kacham, Liberal M.P. for Kings that the existing wharf was in very poor condition and actually unsafe.

Estimated cost of the Murray Harbor wharf repairs is \$3,000. Since it will take some time for the successful bidder to assemble his materials, it is not expected that actual reconstruction work will begin until the spring of 1954.

Thirteen Draggeres Operating Out Of Souris This Season

With thirteen draggeres using activity Eastern Packers, have ventured into a new field. The company has discovered that large quantities of small herring are swarming into the cove just east of it's wharf. Tons and tons of these six to nine inch fish are being trapped each day and shipped to the big sardine plant in Black's Harbor, New Brunswick.

Mr. Paul Gallant, partner in Eastern Packers believes that many of the small inland coves in the province are alive with this type of sea food. He cited this experience as proof that Islanders were not yet aware of the possibilities open to the fishing industry in this province.

At its uptown plant where lobster, meals and fruits are packed in season, many people are presently employed in packing chicken. It is expected, however, that this phase of the company's activities will be completed in a week's time.
