

Hold Missionary Rally In Kensington United Church

A very largely attended and inspirational missionary rally was held in Kensington United Church on Thursday afternoon September 22nd, with Mrs. R. Louis Cairns presiding.

The opening devotional exercises were conducted by Mrs. Allison Proffitt and Mrs. Austin Rogers of the Freetown Auxiliary of the W.M.S. Mrs. Alexander MacKay, Kensington, gave the address of welcome and Mrs. Charles Woodside, Margate, responded.

The Treasurer's report, submitted by Miss Brown, read by Mrs. D. MacKenzie showed that the funds raised to date exceeded last year's figures of the same date by \$464.11, making a grand total of \$746.58.

A large group of the boys and girls of the Kensington Mission Band sang three numbers, and Miss Jean and Margaret Murray rendered a duet.

A roll call of auxiliaries showed representatives from most of all the surrounding communities from Lot 16 to Stanley Bridge.

Mrs. Frank Cutcliffe, P. E. I. Presbyterian president introduced the two outstanding guest speakers, Dr. Florence Murray of Severance Hospital, Seoul, who has spent over 30 years in Korea and Miss Dorothy Young, home organizational executive secretary.

Miss Young in her remarks raised the question "Why Are You Here?" and very effectively led her listeners to see new horizons of service in the home community as well as further afield. Through areas of responsibility and obligation for organization, leadership, renewing Christian education with adults and the receiving of young people for the many channels of Christian work open to them, each member can find means of service right where she resides.

She suggested the importance of keeping in touch with eligible young people who might hear the call of God to serve their fellowmen through the many available channels of the church.

She said that at present the Home Mission Board alone could use 25 Dr. Murray explained the conditions now existing in Korea - that the people are conscious of a brute but not of a peace. She expressed gratitude for relief parcels received and also for the excellent program of rehabilitation carried out by the U. N. K. R. A. She said there is still a great need among the refugees where the crowded conditions of South Korea, half the size of New Brunswick, with over half a million people; inflation, and the rocky country side makes living conditions very difficult.

She said that during the past few years numbers of Koreans have become Christians and she made a stirring appeal for young recruits who are needed for replacements on the mission field and closed her remarks on the note of "Why are you living in luxury in the midst of a world of poverty?"

Following the rally, refreshments were served by the Kensington Auxiliary.

At eight o'clock the church was again filled as these two speakers further awakened the imaginations of their audience as they so effectively portrayed the high needs of service open to those who believe in carrying on Christ's work along

their brothers and sisters at home and abroad.

Miss Young summed up her remarks with "are we fighting fit and strong?" and "are we fit channels for God to use?"

Dr. Murray illustrated her remarks with colored slides which made the conditions of Koreans vivid. Again the need was stressed and also examples of the wonderful work being done to fit amputees with limbs, find employment for war widows and orphanages for the many children who lost their parents.

The Kensington C.G.I.T. led the worship service with special parts taken by Mona Mayhew, Frances Henderson, and Sheila Caseley. The anthem "We Have A Story To Tell To The Nations" was sung. Rev. L. M. Murray introduced Dr. R. Murray and Miss Young and a mixed quartet, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Leart, Mrs. P. J. Kennedy and Mr. Roscoe Walker sang "Come Rest awhile".

A letter was read from Sister St. Agnes Marie, thanking the members for assistance to St. Mary's Academy.

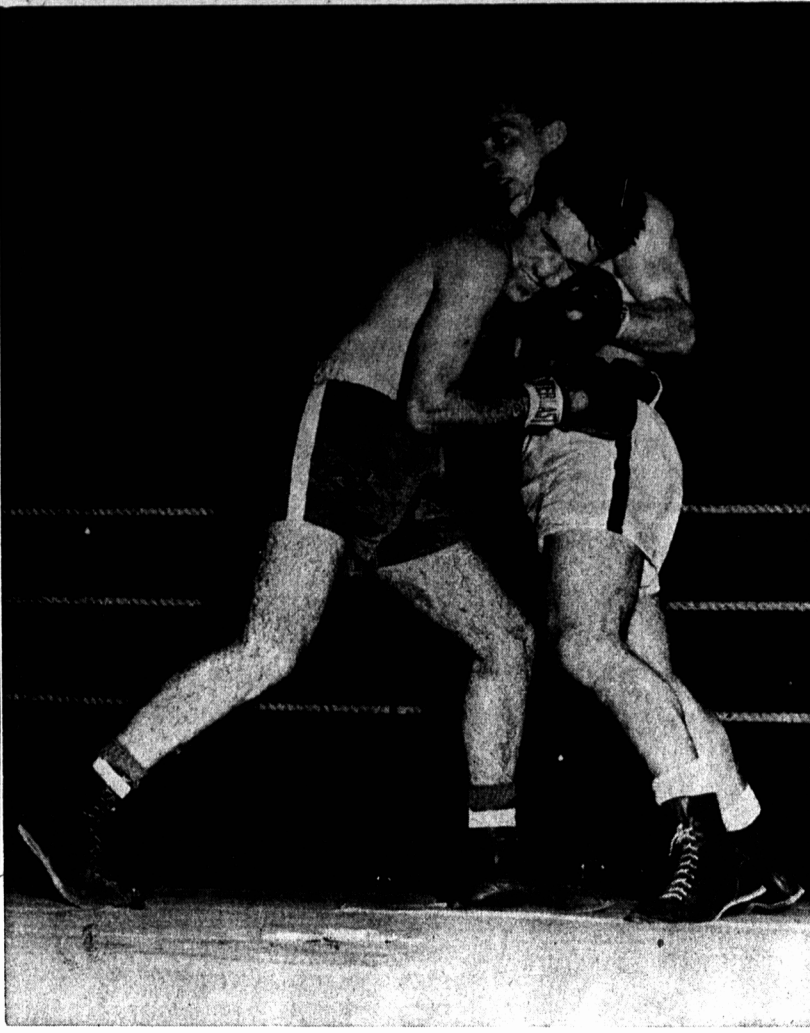

Let's Talk It Over

Another Maritime article has been written depicting the alleged fact that the school is usurping the function of the home in teaching children manners and morals. "It is the home's responsibility," is the now familiar wall. How can the schools possibly take over that duty from the homes when the teachers have the children only half the time they are under the parents' control? Surely there is no time limit on such instruction. Surely the children cannot be told too often the cardinal principles of good manners.

How could teachers possibly avoid teaching children how they should behave? Does this writer mean to imply that teachers should ignore the social conduct of the pupils under their charge—that they should close their eyes to impertinence and other unbecoming behavior which takes place before them? Instruction in manners and morals does not take up time that should be given to other subjects. They are taught casually and incidentally while other classes are being held.

Many of our homes are quite capable of looking after and directing the children's behavior. Children from these homes will need little such instruction or admonition, and will doubtless receive little. But unfortunately some of our homes are such that children see no exemplary conduct for them to imitate, and are given no good advice regarding these matters. Don't you think a teacher's precept and example might help a little in these cases? Leaving children to that type of home instruction, and expecting them to become good citizens is like trying to lift yourself to a higher plane by pulling on your bootstraps. There is far too much of this cry: "Homes should not surrender to the schools," as if the schools were some kind of concentration camp. The neither should surrender to the other, but each should co-operate with the other, and, with the church, form an effective triumvirate to raise the manners and morals of our modern children.
