Entertain Lieut. J. A. Macdonald.

SUPPER LAST NIGHT

Interesting Reminiscences of the South African War.

Empire Lodge of the Knights of Pythias gave Lieut. Macdonald, a valued member of the Order, a right royal welcome upon his return from South Africa. The welcome was given in the Lodge room, Prowse Block, last night, and was most enjoyable and successful from every point of view. The members of the Order turned out well, and each seemed to vie with the other in doing honor to one who had so nobly done his duty in the interests of Queen and country.

About nine o'clock the happy company sat down to supper, which was provided in good style by Mr. Wallace Stewart. Bro. A. G. Peake, Chancellor Commander, presided, having on his right the guest of the evening, Bro. Macdonald, and on his left Dr. H. D. Johnson, Deputy Grand Chancellor. Bro. A. J. McLean, Vice Chancellor, occupied the vice chair, having on his right Rev. J. W. McConnell, Chaplain of Empire Lodge, and on his left Bro. F. S. Jost, Past Chancellor. The members of the press, who were guests of the Lodge for the evening, occupied positions of honor at the right and left of the chairman.

After a thorough discussion of the eatables, the intellectual portion of the entertainment began. The first toast to be honored was "The Queen," which was followed by the singing of God Save the Queen.

Then the health of "Our Guest" was proposed in felicitous terms by Rev. J. W. McConnell, who made some passing references to the war in South Africa and the lessons to be learned therefrom, and on behalf of Empire Lodge extended a hearty welcome to Lieut. Macdonald, who, he felt sure, had exemplified the principles of the Order in South Africa.

Lieut. Macdonald, in reply, expressed his appreciation of the honor done him by Empire Lodge and other associations with which he was connected. He felt, however, that he was not deserving of what had been done for him and said about him. He then gave some interesting information respecting the campaign against the Boers, showing the active part taken there by the Canadians. The Prince Edward islanders did their duty with the best of them, and several acts

of bravery on their part were narrated. Private Small, at the imminent risk of his life, carried a wounded comrade on his shoulders from the firing line at Finsburg to the shelter of the trenches. At Houtneck, Neco Dorion, another Islander, could not be induced to take a prone position during the fight, but persisted in firing from his knee in the face of a murderous fire from the Boers. At Zand River, Color Sergt. Lorne Stewart, of Charlotte-town, was, during the thickest of the fight, chosen to take a message to the front to Col. Pelletier. There was a perfect hurricane of bullets at the time and the manner in which Sergeant Stewart performed this soldierly duty elicited the admiration of all. The boys also held out well in the long marches. Lieut. Macdonald brought his remarks to a close with a feeling and fitting reference to the two islanders who had given up their lives for their country, Roland Taylor and Alfred Riggs.

The Grand Lodge of the Knights of Pythias was next toasted and responded to in a fitting manner by Dr. Johnson, who on behalf of the Grand Lodge, extended a hearty welcome to Lieut. Macdonald.

"Sister Societies" brought G. D. Wright and James Waddell to their feet; and S. A. Macdonald responded on behalf of "The Army and Navy."

Councillor Taylor, who managed to get away from the street roller, replied to the toast of "The Mayor and Corporation."

"The Clergy" was fittingly responded to by Rev. J. W. McConnell. "The Bench and Bar" brought up Murdoch McLeod; and "The Press" Messrs. McCreedy, McInnis and Macdonald.

Messrs. Leonard McKay, J. H. Williams and Frank McKie looked after "The Ladies" with characteristic gallantry.

The health of the committee managing the entertainment was proposed by Lieut. Macdonald, and responded to by F. S. Jost, Fred Newson and A. G. Peake.

Between the speeches some most enjoyable selections were given on the gramophone, the roll call of Empire Lodge being especially appropriate.

The singing of God Save the Queen brought the proceedings to a close.

MR. FARQUHARSON AND MR. TARTE.

Premier Farquharson of Prince Edward Island was at Ottawa when the dissolution of the assembly was announced. He is said to have had some interesting conferences there and is expected to make certain announcements. It is a comfortable thing to know that Mr. Farquharson has agreeable relations with Mr. Tarte, and that he is not wholly dependent upon provincial politics for his subsistence. The premier is said to be the owner of the tug T. A. Stewart, which works in connection with the dredge Prince Edward in Prince Edward Island waters. During the fiscal year 1897-98, this tug was employed 148 3/5 days at the hind one recompense of \$26 per day, her total earnings being \$3,115. In the season of 1898-99, this industrious and thrifty tug did still better, putting in 173 1/2 days, at \$25, and one night at the same price, earning \$4,312.25. It will be judged that the relations between Mr. Tarte and the Prince Edward Island government were quite intimate, even before the Pineo episode.—St. John's Sun.
