Attendance At S'ide X-ray Clinic Down

When the free chest X-ray clinic closed for the day on yesterday only 720 persons had taken advantage of this free X-ray clinic being held on the second floor of the Armouries on Summer Street next to the Town Hall in Summerside.

This is much less than half the number who were X-rayed when the clinic was held here two years ago this month.

The X-ray clinic is now in its third and final week in Summerside, and will be leaving after its day's work on Friday of this week.

The X-ray unit is not expected to be back in Summerside before another two years, and it is hoped that many hundreds of people will avail themselves of the opportunity to take advantage of this free chest X-ray before the unit leaves on Friday.

The staff of three, in charge of the unit, is composed of Messrs. J. B. MacLaren, and Harry North of Charlottetown, and Mrs. Gorth G. of Summerside, and are so well organized that they are prepared to take X-rays of seventy to eighty persons per hour.

Hours are from 10 to 12 a.m. and 2 to 5 p.m. daily, until Friday of this week. The clinic will then be open on Thursday night from 7 to 8:30 p.m.

Holmors and the Bank of Nova Scotia have given time off from work to their employees, so that they might have these free chest X-rays, and it is hoped that many other businesses in Summerside will also, by similar action, encourage their employees to X-ray.

It is believed that most children of school age were X-rayed in the schools before the unit went to the Armouries, and the total figure of children X-rayed corresponds favourably with the number X-rayed when the unit was in Summerside two years ago.

Those in charge of the unit, however, expressed disappointment at the turn-out of adults, especially when: (1) the X-ray requires less than a minute of their time, (2) they are not required to remove any of their clothing, (3) no pain or feeling of any kind is experienced, and (4) it is absolutely free.

As was pointed out by the staff the advantages of a chest X-ray are two-fold. If, after the X-ray, they do not hear from the doctor within a specified period of time, they can justly feel happy in knowing that their lungs are free from T.B. If, on the other hand, the X-ray shows possible indications of tuberculosis in their lungs they will be summoned to Charlottetown for a further diagnosis, and if necessary suitable treatment will be recommended.

Regret was expressed that there was no exact record available to the staff of the clinic to indicate the very large number of persons in this Province who have contacted tuberculosis, had this fact discovered by X-ray, given treatment, fully recovered, and returned to a normal, productive, and useful life.

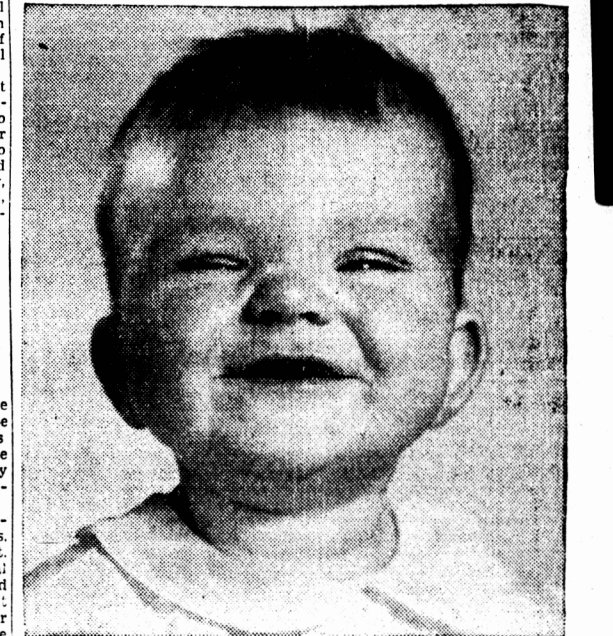
