A CURIOUS AFFAIR.—Philip Melanson, of Lakeburn, Paussec Road, who has given evidence of derangement of mind the past week or two, had a rather strange and very unpleasant experience last week. Last Friday afternoon he disappeared from his home and his family were unable to get any tidings from him until he was brought home on Sunday morning in a rather precarious condition. A BIG COMPANY.—There was hardly standing room at the Toronto Opera House last evening at the initial performance of Charles H. Yale's "Forever Devil's Auction". The house was simply jammed and after 7.30 o'clock not a reserved seat ticket could be obtained. The show suited the audience immensely, and applause at times was deafening. As a spectacular production "The Devil's Auction" beats anything that has been put on at Toronto yet. The scenery is mostly new and magnificently painted. The colors have been used with an unstinted hand, and the result is a series of brilliant stage pictures. The costumes are fresh and resplendent with spangles and brilliants. The play consists of three long acts, and is brim full of comedy, songs and dances from start to finish. Ben T. Grinnell provides most of the amusement and is ably seconded by Mayme Mayo. Some very clever specialties were introduced by Phyllis Allen, Colby and De Witt, Alexander Decca and the Brothers Phantoe. The ballet corps is large and well trained. The principal dancers exercised their movements with skill and grace and were encored several times. The above company will be at the Opera House, on 11th, 12th and 13th, Oct. next. The company is the largest ever visited Charlottetown.

Postage on Newspapers.

OTTAWA, Sept. 19.—The post office department has sent a circular to all newspapers in Canada notifying them of the re-imposition of postage on newspapers of a quarter cent per pound from 1st January and half a cent from 1st July. It does not apply to weeklies sent to within 20 miles of the office or within a circular area 40 miles in diameter.

A Destructive Hurricane.

MADRID, Sept. 19.—A destructive hurricane today swept over southern Spain doing great damage in the provinces of Seville and Granada. Six persons were killed and many injured, and a number of buildings were destroyed at Seville, and 85 houses were demolished and many persons fell victims to the storm at Gaudix, in the province of Granada.

Many Died at Sea.

MADRID, Sept. 19.—There is considerable indignation here at the fact that there were 123 deaths during the voyage, among the 1000 Spanish soldiers who have just arrived in Spain on board the Spanish transport San Ignacio de Loyola, from Santiago.

The Spaniards attribute this heavy death rate to the "inhumanity of the Americans in obliging the sick Spaniards to embark and make room in the hospital for Americans."
