We announce to-day, with deep regret, the death of Mr. A. H. MacPherson, who was for a number of years City Clerk of Charlottetown.

The Tunnel.

It seems that we may have a tunnel twelve feet in diameter for \$5,000,000, or a tunnel sixteen feet in diameter for \$10,000,000.

However this may be, it is clear, in view of the prospective demands of the traffic, that if it be built at all, the tunnel ought to be sufficiently large to admit an ordinary train, and not necessitate unloading and loading up again at each end.

The report of Sir Douglas Fox will be awaited with interest. In the meantime, it may be well for the Board of Trade and others to consider the next step to be taken in the promotion of the tunnel scheme.

"A Silly Contention."

It is the policy of the grits in office, to raise a hue and cry concerning "the financial state of the Province" in order that they may have an excuse to levy heavy taxation, and "bleed the country" as they did in the unhappy years of 1877 and 1878.

That the practice of overrunning the receipts of the Province and paying interest to the banks is vicious, has been over and over again declared and protested against by THE EXAMINER.

That the present Government will find any great difficulty in adjusting our finances is—in view of the Patriot's admission—a silly contention. The late Government, had they remained in power, would have met the difficulty—in spite of the Legislative Council; the present Government have the aid and support of the Legislative Council, and they can do so much more easily, and (if they choose) much more satisfactorily.

News Notes.

Jews are being driven in herds from Moscow and Kiev.

A coal famine is impending in some parts of Germany, owing to the miners' strike.

The French ambassador to Russia has tendered his resignation.

A general strike of all the building trades took place at Zanesville, O., a few days ago, and all building work is stopped.

Owners of vessels usually consider that they show honor to an individual when they confer his or her name on a ship, but hereafter they will have to be careful to get the consent of the owner of the name, as Miss Kittie Marshall, a Kentucky girl, has just recovered \$500 from a steamboat company which gave her name to one of its steamers without her consent.

The Late Bishop McIntyre.

FUNERAL OBSEQUIES.

The casket containing all that was mortal of the Right Rev. Peter McIntyre, Bishop of Charlottetown, arrived here from Pictou in the Princess of Wales last night.

This evening at six o'clock the body will be taken to the Cathedral, where it will remain until the funeral. The Office of the Dead will be sung in the Cathedral this evening at six o'clock.

To-morrow morning at ten o'clock there will be a Solemn Requiem Mass for the repose of the soul of the deceased Bishop. The funeral will leave the Cathedral for the railway station at two o'clock to-morrow afternoon, thence by special train to St. Peter's, where the interment will take place.

His Lordship's death was very sudden. After taking tea with Bishop Cameron, he chatted pleasantly with his host and some other clergymen until shortly before nine o'clock, when he retired to his room. A little later, Father Gillis, in passing his door, heard a groan within, and on going inside found his Lordship prostrated on the bed.

Mr. Macdonald, who left here with His Lordship, returned last evening with the body. He was accompanied by Dr. McNeill, Rector of the College at Antigonish, who was one of the clergymen present with His Lordship at the episcopal residence on the evening of his death. The Bishops of the other Provinces are expected here this evening.

Flags are displayed at half-mast to-day on most of the public buildings and places of business out of respect to the memory of His Lordship.

Personal.

Patrick Purcell, ex-M. P., died at Annapolis yesterday, aged 68.

Judge Hensley, Mrs. Hensley and Miss Hensley, of Charlottetown, were registered at the Halifax Hotel, Halifax, on Wednesday.

On the list of those selected for honor at the McGill arts convocation, appears the name of Rev. Moses Harvey, of St. John's, Nfld. In his somewhat isolated home, Rev. Mr. Harvey has been able to contribute not a little to the world's knowledge of the ancient colony whose affairs are at the moment attracting such general attention. He is known both as a writer and enquirer. He has produced a history of Newfoundland and gathered and disseminated such knowledge of its people, resources and peculiarities. He will worthily wear his title of LL.D.

An International Tunnel.

The Canadian and Michigan Tunnel Company, which was incorporated by act of the Dominion Parliament in 1890, began the excavation on Thursday of a railroad tunnel under the Detroit river. The act prescribes that the company may conduct and manage a railroad tunnel under the waters of the Detroit River, from some point at or near the towns of Windsor or Sandwich, Ont., and place therein one or more tracks, and construct a railway not exceeding five miles in length, as an approach, and such other approaches as may be necessary. The company may acquire all lands or beaches necessary to construct the tunnel under the provisions of the Canadian Railway Act. The capital stock of the company is \$5,000,000, with power to increase to \$10,000,000.

French Intrigues.

St. John's Nfld., April 30.—Some days ago over fifty bait carriers well loaded escaped the Government cruisers at Fortune Bay and sailed with their cargoes for St. Pierre.

Information has just been received to the effect that these schooners are returning with men incited to rebellion by the French fish merchants of St. Pierre who had supplied them with arms, ammunition and liquor. Much anxiety is felt.

The Government despatched another steamer last night with a force of men under command of Colonel Fawcett. The warship Pelican will be ordered to proceed to Fortune Bay instead of St. George's Bay.

Very serious trouble is expected to follow this intrigue and aggression on the part of the French.

The Ship Railway.

AMHERST, April 30.—The financial condition of the Chignecto Ship Railway is in no precarious state whatever. The company has abundant means, and large forces of men are being employed as fast as the condition of the ground, owing to the frost, will permit.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

NOTES AND CLIPPINGS.

HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE SENATE:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I am glad to welcome you to the duties of the first session of a new parliament, which I hope will be memorable for wise deliberations and for measures adapted to the progress and development of the Dominion.

The season in which you are assembled has opened auspiciously for the industries of our people. Let us hope that their labors may be crowned with fruitful returns from land and sea and that the great resources of Canada may continue to reward the toil and enterprise of its inhabitants.

My advisers, availing themselves of opportunities which were presented in the closing months of last year, caused the administration of the United States to be reminded of the willingness of the government of Canada to join in making efforts for the extension and development of the trade between the Republic and the Dominion, as well as for the friendly adjustment of those matters of an international character which remain unsettled. I am pleased to say that these representations have resulted in an assurance that, in October next, the government of the United States will be prepared to enter on a conference to consider the best means of arriving at a practical solution of these important questions. The papers relating to this subject will be laid before you. Under these circumstances, and in the hope that the proposed conference may result in arrangements beneficial to both countries, you will be called upon to consider the expediency of extending, for the present season, the principal provisions of the protocol annexed to the Washington treaty, 1888, known as the "modus vivendi."

A disposition having been manifested in the United Kingdom to impose on sea-going ships engaged in the cattle trade increased safeguards for life and greater restrictions against improper treatment, a careful enquiry has been made as to the incidents of that trade in so far as this country is concerned. The evidence elicited on this enquiry will be laid before you. While I am glad to learn that our shipping is free from reproach in that regard, your attention will be invited to a measure which will remove all reasonable apprehension of abuses arising in the future in connection with so important a branch of our commerce.

The early coming into force of the imperial statute relating to the vice-admiralty courts of the empire has made it necessary to revise the laws in force in Canada respecting our courts of maritime jurisdiction, and a measure will therefore be laid before you designed to reorganize those tribunals.

A code of the criminal law has been prepared in order that that branch of our jurisprudence may be simplified and improved, to which your best attention is invited.

Measures relating to the fisheries of the Dominion, and to the obstruction of navigable waters, will be submitted to you, and you will also be asked to consider amendments to the acts relating to the Northwest territories, to the exchequer court acts and to the acts relating to trade-marks.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

The accounts for the past year will be submitted to you. The revenue, after providing for the services to which you appropriate it, has left a surplus for the works which you designed to be carried out by capital expenditure. The estimates for the coming year will be laid before you at an early date.

HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE SENATE:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I pray that in the consideration of these matters and in the performance of all the labors which will devolve upon you, your deliberations may be divinely aided, and that your wisdom and patriotism may enlarge the prosperity of the Dominion and promote in every way the well-being of its people.

A DISGUSTED MAN.

The Parliamentary correspondent of the St. John Sun writes:—

"Davies, of P. E. Island, is a very much disgusted man. Notwithstanding the fact that his party had taken the lead in the Dominion in re-opening the election fight by petition he maintained the belief that his little province would be an exception to the rule, seeing that as the Grits had four members to the other party's two they had everything to gain by leaving matters alone, hence Mr. Davies advised his friends to make no protest against McDonald and McLean, which advice was taken. After the time for a protest against the Conservatives had passed, Davies and his friends were served with notice of petition. He now wishes he could get at McDonald and McLean."

CONSERVATIVE WHIPS.

The following Conservative whips have been elected: Taylor, McKay and Corby for Ontario; Bergeron, Pope and Frechette for Quebec. Daily will keep run of the members from the wild and woolly west. Josiah Wood has charge of the baker's dozen from New Brunswick, while Sir John A. Macdonald has the call on the Nova Scotia contingent. The opposition whips are Trow and Sutherland of Ontario, Brodeur and Carroll of Quebec. The number of representatives from the maritime provinces and the west is so small that no danger is feared that any will be missing on division.

TO FORCE THE FIGHTING.

The opposition threaten to force the fighting this session. This threat would perhaps be regarded more seriously if the opposition had not always forced the fighting all they could. It cannot be learned that any new source of strength has been discovered, or that as yet any new policy has been invented. It was believed until this afternoon that Mr. Laurier would move an amendment to the reply to the address, but at the caucus to-day no such policy was determined upon. Both parties held caucuses to-day. Sir John made a cheerful address to his friends, intimating that the opposition would probably pursue an aggressive campaign, as far as possible, and observing that the Conservatives would probably be found as ready to force the fighting as their enemy.

DUAL LANGUAGE QUESTION.

The Manitoba language question will be on hand early. Mr. Lariviere, a conservative member from that province, has taken the wind out of the sails of both the grits and equal righters by making the first enquiry for papers bearing on the subject. Mr. Devlin, a grit member for Ottawa

county, has made a similar motion respecting the Manitoba schools legislation.

M'GREGG CONTRACTS.

Mr. Tarte has given notice of motion for returns bearing on the McGregg contracts. He proposes to push this enquiry. No pushing will, however, be necessary, as the government will probably do all that is possible to have a thorough and expeditious investigation. Probably the course taken in the Rykert case will be followed.

THE NEW SPEAKER.

Hon. Peter White, the new speaker, has sat continuously in the Commons for North Renfrew since 1876. Mr. White was born in Pembroke, County Renfrew, Ontario, in 1838, of Scotch parentage, and was married to Miss Thompson, of Ottawa, in 1877. He is an able debater, an ardent parliamentarian, and well versed in politics. He is a lumber merchant and possessed of an ample fortune.

Carrie Brown's Murderer.

NEW YORK, April 30.—Inspector Byrnes declares he has evidence sufficient to fasten the guilt of the murder of Carrie Brown on Frank Sherlick (Frenchy No. 1), who was arrested the night following the murder, and who has been locked up ever since. On the night the murder was committed Frenchy No. 1 occupied room 23 in the Fourth Ward hotel with a woman by the name of Mary Ann Lopez. This room was across the hall from that occupied by the woman Brown and her unknown companion. From information in the possession of the police it appears that the murdered woman's companion left her some time before one o'clock on Friday morning. Frenchy No. 1 had been at one time a lover of the old woman, but for some reason had become insanely jealous of her. He heard her companion leave the room, and shortly afterwards he got up and, leaving the Lopez woman asleep, crossed the hall and committed the awful crime. When he had completed his murderous work he re-crossed the hall and entered room 33. In that room he left evidences of his guilt, including traces of blood on the wall, chair and floor.
