

National Park Records Show Million Visitors

Prince Edward Island is enjoying its greatest tourist season in history. It is indicated by National Park visiting and camping figures, and record traffic figures at Borden and Wood Islands, released yesterday.

The National Park for the first time in history, soared over the million mark in the number of visitors during July and August, with an astounding total of 947,838 more visitors was recorded this year over last year. This year's total was 1,136,553, compared with 834,773 in 1961, park superintendent Eric Kipping said.

At the same time, the number of campers using facilities at St. Dunstan's and Cavendish jumped more than 3,000, with 37,388 registered this year compared with 34,192 last year.

Passenger travel at Wood Islands in 1961 was 108,275, a comparison with 113,890 this year, while vehicle traffic jumped from 37,070 in 1961 to 39,233 this year.

Mr. Kipping said nine counters were used in determining the number of cars that came into the park. A 25 per cent allowance is made for "locals" and repeaters, and a 50 per cent allowance is made for all vehicles on the thought that cars that go into the park must also leave it.

"Locals," he explained, "are those who park and drive in the park and are using the roads continuously."

Mr. Kipping also announced that registrations at Green Gables rose from 34,192 in 1961 to 34,602 this year.

He said this was highly significant as not all visitors register, and said it is known from past experience that more visitors at any one time leads to fewer registrations at that time.

'Prince' Leaves Today For Refit

Defendant Ordered To Pay Half Of Damages And Costs

SUMMERSIDE — Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell handed down judgment in the Provincial Court at Summerside yesterday that apportioned the liability equally between the plaintiff and the defendants, in an action for damages in which Ernest Paynter, Summerside was plaintiff and Melvin J. Dodds and Coop Farm Services, the defendants.

The litigation resulted from a collision between a 1959 Mercury three-ton truck, owned by Mr. Paynter and a 1959 GMC half-ton truck driven by M. J. Dodds and owned by Coop Farm Services, Summerside on Feb. 2, 1962 on Central Street.

A counter claim by Coop Farm Services was withdrawn earlier.

The accident occurred when the plaintiff's truck, driven by his son Carman, turned left on Central Street from Green Street, after the defendant's truck had been backed out of a private driveway on the west side of Central Street and had momentarily stopped before starting forward.

The Chief Justice found that the collision and consequent damages were caused by the negligence of each driver in failing to maintain a sufficiently comprehensive outlook.

The judgment of the court was that the plaintiff recover against the defendants 50 per cent of his damages that were assessed at \$224.24 and 50 per cent of his costs.
