GREAT MEETING AT RUSTICO

One of the largest and most enthusiastic
meetings of the campaign was held in
the large hall at Rustico last evening.
The chair was occupied by Mr. Gallant,
who discharged his duties to the satisfac-
tion of all.

The first speaker was Mr. D. A. Mc-
Kinnon, the Liberal candidate. His
speech consisted of a rambling rehash of
wonderful Liberal performances. As
usual he wearied the audience with his
futile efforts.

Mr. Martin followed, and delivered one
to the most convincing addresses yet
listened to in the public questions of the
day. He was in splendid form and fully
exposed the corrupt methods of the Lib-
erals on order to retain power. He pointed
out that Mr. McKinnon had called the
meetings without even the courtesy of
consulting him, and that Mr. McKinnon
had omitted to call meetings at some of
the most important centres in the district,
such as Vernon River, Mount Stewart and
Wheatley River.

Mr. Martin was followed by Premier
Farquharson, who told the electors that
if they wanted an addition to
their breakwater and other
public works they must vote for Mr. Mc-
Kinnon. This attempt to browbeat and
coerce the people of Rustico was received
with the derision and contempt which it
deserved.

Senator Ferguson next addressed the
meeting, and clearly showed the shifting
and vacillating policy of the Liberal
party. He ably reviewed the position
taken by Sir Charles Tupper on Preferen-
tial Trade and carried the audience with
him.

Dr. Douglas followed in a loud style of
oratory, but the audience would not lis-
ten to him, and he was obliged to desist.

Mr. J. J. Johnston was next called upon
by the chairman. Mr. Johnston quickly
caught the attention of the audience, and
ably showed the impartial man-
ner in which the Conservative
party had always dealt with
the French people in Canada, and con-
trasted it with the way the Provincial
Government had used the French race in
P. E. Island. He also briefly referred to
the strange conduct of an Attorney Gen-
eral still drawing his salary and running
for a seat in parliament. His speech
created a most favorable impression and
was heartily applauded.

Mr. Blanchard, followed and tried to
excuse the Liberal party for their many
short-comings. But his task was a heavy
one.

Mr. Doyle and Mr. Buote also made
short speeches.

The meeting was by a large majority,
Conservative. It was closed with cheers
for the Queen and the Conservative can-
didate.

—Thanksgiving Day was generally

THE COOK CASE.

Mr. H. H. Cook, a very wealthy and
able member of the Old Liberal party, re-
cently sent a two-page letter to the press
in which he denounced utterly the prom-
ise-breaking, unscrupulous and extrava-
gant politicians who have in the past four
years while in office at Ottawa disgraced
Liberalism. His charges, full and particu-
lar, have not been met. Some of the govern-
ment's paid papers declared that Mr.
Cook was a disappointed office-seeker.
Mr. Cook retorted that he had been offer-
ed a Senatorship if he would pay \$10,
000 for it. This caused a sensation, and
brought forth a denial from Sir Wilfrid
Laurier. To this denial Mr. Cook has
replied:

"One of your followers has directly, and
some of your organs have by inference,
stated that in making these charges I am
influenced by a failure to secure a Sena-
torship. Replying to this statement I
have said I was offered a seat in the Sen-
ate if I would pay \$10,000. You have
taken it upon yourself to essay denial of
this. Of my statement and your denial
I shall have something to say again. In
the meantime, let me point out to you
that, even if I were improperly influenced
in making these charges, this would not
lessen their seriousness or be any
answer to them. Your offence is not
against me, but against the decency-lev-
ing people of Canada, against every man
who believes that public men should be
truthful, honest and clean."

Mr. Cook also reiterates his charges in
brief. He cites seventeen specific instan-
ces in which the government has betrayed
the principles of the Liberal party and
broken faith with the people of Canada.

They are:

1. Appointment of members of Parli-
ament to office.
2. Refusal to allow judicial enquiry
into charges of corruption, etc., against a
minister.
3. Increasing the public debt and ex-
penditure in violation of promises.
4. Increased taxation of people by
\$1.16 per head.
5. Failed to put aside the last vestige
of protection.
6. Failed to send commissioners to
arrange for preferential trade.
7. Basely tricked and betrayed the
Temperance people of Canada.
8. Failed to lessen the number of
cabinet ministers.
9. Increased superannuation allow-
ances.
10. Failed to abolish the department
of trade and commerce.
11. Failed to make an honest attempt
to abolish the Senate.
12. Instead of doing away with trusts
and monopolies increased them.
13. Increased expenditure for admin-
istration of justice.
14. Failed to keep pledge to stop the
granting of public lands to railways.
15. Deliberately broke promise to
stop granting of cash bonuses to rail-
ways.
16. Instead of reducing expenditure
for immigration, have doubled it.
17. I charge your government with
entering into a corrupt deal with a num-
ber of men, some of the directors of the
Globe printing company, by which these
men were enabled to grab a quarter of a
million acres of coal lands, and the
country was defrauded out of two mil-
lion dollars. Can you deny this?

We shall hear what Sir Wilfrid
says in reply to this arraignment.

WHAT IT WILL BE.

"The upsetting of the present admin-
istration will not be a defeat of the genuine
Liberals because they believe in uphold-
ing the honor of the country.

"It will be the defeat of a gang of men
who have usurped the Liberal name, who
have broken every pledge and violated
every vow that was ever made in the
name of Liberalism.

"It will be a defeat to those who have
flung so the breeze their banners with
the unholy inscriptions, 'It is wrong to
buy votes—when you don't need them,'
and 'Elections are not won by prayer.'

"It will be a defeat for all those who
seek to live by sectarian strife and cries of
race.

"It will be a defeat for time-servers
and for those who wish to draw money
from the public till.

"It will be a defeat for the ballot-stuff-
ing, bribing machine, and for all the corrupt-
ing crew; but it will be a triumph for the
public conscience of Canada, and it will
teach this never to be forgotten lesson,
that if public men expect to retain public
confidence they must be morally and polit-
ically clean."
