## British Columbia Lions Beat Winnipeg Bombers

VANCOUVER (CP)—British Columbia Lions scored four touchdowns on their first two tries and stayed ahead to defeat Winnipeg Bombers 20-10 Sunday afternoon in a game that ended the Western Football Conference schedule and established a Canadian attendance record.

The conference champions, who had suffered their only two losses in the West this season at Winnipeg's hands, retaliated in the third meeting with an alert defence and a deadly passing combination of quarterback Joe Kapp and flanker Sonny Homer.

Attendance for the final game was 32,646 taking the total for the year to 251,712, a Canadian Football League record.

Winnipeg halfback and place-kicker George Fleming picked up only two points in the game, bringing his season's total to 135 and easily clinching the league scoring championship. But he fell short by 10 points of George Hill's record established with Saskatchewan in 1958.

And Lions halfback Willie Fleming picked up only 44 of the 150 yards he needed to overtake Calgary's Lovell Coleman for the conference rushing title.

Fleming's total for the year was 1,254 yards, Coleman picked up 1,239. Fleming still established a conference mark for average yards a carry, his season working out to about 10 yards every time he took the ball.

Kapp, fullback Nub Beamer and Jerry James and Homer scored the B.C. touchdowns, all four converted by Peter Kempf.

End Bernie Pitts scored the only Winnipeg touchdown and a safety touch.

## Tiger-Cats Bomb Alouettes 49-21

MONTREAL (CP)—Hamilton Tiger-Cats put on a dazzling display of power Sunday 10-11 while Alouettes 49-21 in the last regular scheduled game of the Eastern Football Conference.

The game, before 19,337 fans in cool 49-degree weather, had no bearing on the playoff standings Montreal will meet Ottawa Rough Riders next Saturday in Ottawa in a sudden-death playoff for the right to meet Hamilton in the finals.

Halfbacks Art Baker and Bertie led the Hamilton attack with two touchdowns each. Other Hamilton touch-downs went to halfback Tommy Grant, end Hal Patterson, and quarterback Frank Consentino.

Don Stewart picked up five points on converts, while five remaining two points came on a safety touch.

Montreal touchdowns went to halfback Tommy Burket and Warren Rabb, while Gino Barretta kicked three converts.

The Tiger-Cats led 40, 157, and 36-21 at the quarters.

The win gave the Tiger-Cats a season record of 10 wins and four losses, one win more than against Toronto.
