CANADIAN HEROES IN LIVERPOOL.

Lord Mayor's Hospitality—Mr. Mellish's Speech.

The following is condensed from the Liverpool (Eng.) Daily Post of Nov. 2nd:

"Yesterday a considerable contingent of Canadian Volunteers who had seen much active service passed through Liverpool en route to Canada. They had seen twelve months active service. Most of them had been at the chief engagements of the war. Some of them were mere youths but they were all fine strapping fellows. The Lord Mayor has for a long time desired to entertain a body of Canadian troops on their return from the war, and entertained these at the Town Hall luncheon. This pleasant gathering took place in the small ball-room and passed off very successfully. His Lordship presided wearing his chain of office.

After the toast to the Queen the Lord Mayor submitted the toast of the Canadian Contingent present in very complimentary terms, stating that he understood they had faced the fire of the foe on fifty or sixty occasions, and what had taken place, looking all round, had cemented together and consolidated the Empire in all its ramifications.

Sergeant Mellish (a Canadian Barrister) of the Canadian Rifles, replied in a humorous speech. He alluded to the fact that within three days of the notice that Canadian volunteers would be accepted, a force of 50,000 men offered their services. They went off glad to get to the front, even in a herring boat. (Laughter.) They reached Belmont and other points where they made a scoop of the Boers; but he did not want to claim all the credit for the Canadians, for they were mixed up with Australians and British regular soldiers, who maintained the high prestige of the British army. He was glad that on many occasions they had met the Lancashire boys at the front, of whom he retained many very pleasant memories (hear, hear.) Canada had been deeply stirred over this war. He recalled several instances of great devotion to the Empire. One young man whom he knew had intended to study for the ministry and had the money to carry him through his college course, but he threw up all idea of this and went to the war instead. He was killed unfortunately in the trenches at Paardeberg, but when the news reached Canada his own brother insisted upon going to the front to fill the vacancy. (Applause.) Another of their number had his arm shattered, but when his brother heard of it he too, would go out to stand in the gap caused by his brother's wound. (Loud applause.) He wanted not to exceed the limits of modesty, but they were always told by their commanding officers to look upon their own corps as the best in the field (laughter and applause) and he could say, on behalf of himself, the mounted men and artillery, and also of Lord Strathcona's horse, that they had never sustained a reverse (loud applause). He assured the Lord Mayor that his entertainment of the Canadians that afternoon would always remain a pleasant recollection associated with their experiences since they left home, and that the kindness of English, Irish and Scotch—of everybody—was universal and most hearty (hear, hear). The people of Great Britain might depend on it that if the services of Canada were wanted again on any similar occasion they would be forthcoming with great cordiality and that not only 50,000 but 200,000 men would loyally respond to the call. (Loud applause.)

The proceedings shortly afterwards terminated, the men proceeding to dock to embark on the Carthaginian amidst the cheers of an enthusiastic crowd. Sergeant Mellish, it may be added, has a very strong resemblance to Col. Baden-Powell, and might pass as his double.

The Liberal-Conservatives propose dealing with the political situation without gloves at their meeting in the Benevolent Irish Society rooms this evening.
