Notes and Clippings.

We regret that the present owners of the steamer M. A. Starr are unable to keep her on the present route.

It is estimated at the Treasury Department in Washington that owing to large pension payments, nearly \$18,000,000 coming on top of other large payments in July, the debt statement will show that the public debt has increased about \$1,500,000 during the month of August.

Sir Hector Langevin said, in the course of an off hand speech at Toronto: "I am not a provincialist, I am not a Quebecer nor an Ontario man, I am a Dominion man. The Dominion with its unity, first, last and for ever. Let no race or class prejudice interfere with the great and growing prosperity of this wondrous land."

In mining parlance, the richest pocket of wealth in the United States, if not in the world, is to be found on the Hudson river between Dobb's ferry and Tarrytown, where 63 millionaires reside within a distance of six miles—about one millionaire to every thirty rods. The aggregate wealth of these nabobs is computed at over \$500,000,000.

The Empire says: "The Executive of Canada, the Parliamentary representatives of the Canadian people, the Governor-General as an imperial officer, and finally the law officers of the Crown have all united in declaring that this question of public interest is one for the people of Quebec by their constitutional and responsible representatives to consider and determine. All these authorities concur in holding that the circumstances do not warrant interference with the Provincial autonomy."

The number of applications for registration on the voters' lists for Queen's County, received and accepted by Judge A'Key, was 1,996; the number of applications for removal of names from the lists was 1,571—so that the net addition to the lists is 425. These figures may not be strictly accurate, but they are very nearly so. The applications made for registration and removal of names are open to inspection at the office of the Clerk of the County Court, Provincial Building.

A traveller in India has recently been revealing the results of an observation of the tricks and schemes of habitual criminals in that vast country. One favorite device of thieves was to form a pouch or pocket in the throat, where valuables could be concealed. This pouch was formed by partially swallowing a ball of some hard substance and keeping it for some time each day some place near the epiglottis. This continued daily, gradually a sac or space would form, into which the criminal, when pursued, could slip money or jewels, and defy search. Another trick was to swallow some irritant which would secure a prisoner easy work or hospital quarters while in jail. One man was pointed out who, in order to get off his fetters, had produced an ulcer by rubbing the chafed skin with caustic lime, and then irritating the sore by scratching it with a piece of broken bottle. These guilty, but unfortunate fellows, like comrades in some enlightened countries, are at greater pains to practice vice than virtue, being either careless or ignorant of the fact that half the expended in the other direction would make them good and prosperous members of society.

Telegraphic Odds and Ends.

A BUDGET OF GENERAL NEWS FROM ALL PARTS OF THE WORLD.

LONDON, Sept. 6.—The Turkish Ministry of War has ordered 100,000 Muser repeating rifles to be ready in a month for distribution among the troops.

VIENNA, Sept. 6.—The Neue Freie Presse says that should the Czar visit Paris, the whole world would believe that Europe was on the eve of a general war.

PARIS, Sept. 6.—Shocks of earthquake were felt yesterday throughout the western portion of France. The oscillations were especially strong at Angers and Nantes.

BERLIN, Sept. 6.—The Vossische Zeitung says: "It is scarcely possible to doubt that Germany has formally renounced to England the expansion of the present sphere of German influence in Africa."

PEORIA, Ill., Sept. 6.—Miners along Iowa Central and Toledo, Peoria and Western Railways, struck yesterday for an advance of 10 cents per ton. The trouble is liable to lead to a general strike throughout the Peoria district.

EDINBURGH, Sept. 6.—The colliery explosion yesterday resulted in the death of fifty miners, only 14 of the 64 men at work in the pit having been rescued. The scene of the disaster was Penicuik, a small town within ten miles of this city.

LONDON, Sept. 6.—It is rumored that the Porte will send special commissioners to inquire into the outrages in Armenia, especially those mentioned by Gladstone. The directors of the Danube Shipping Company assert that Austrian arms are being largely imported into Bulgaria, and that Austrian army instructors are also arriving.

GULFBURG, Ont., Sept. 6.—David Von Volkensberg, a G. T. R. brakeman from Point Edward, was found dead this morning. It is supposed he fell between the cars of a freight train going east. One arm and his head was almost severed from the body.

ZANZIBAR, Sept. 6.—Capt. Wisemann, with 400 men, has started for Wyaawa to punish Bushiri for killing officer Neilson of the East African Company.

PARIS, Sept. 6.—The Temps says the government will not reply to Boulanger's demand for trial by court martial.

TORONTO, Sept. 6.—There is a rumor of a general reduction in the price of coal and one prominent firm advertises to-night a reduction of 50 cents a ton all around.

MONTREAL, Sept. 6.—The safe in the post office at St. Justin was blown open with dynamite last night; \$1,000 in cash and \$500 in registered letters carried away.

THE MIRAMICHI.—The steamer Miramichi arrived here on Saturday morning, at two o'clock, and sailed again at nine. She had a miscellaneous cargo and a number of passengers.

Cricket.

Boston Markets.

BOSTON, Sept. 5.

EGGS.—The arrivals have been moderate, and there has been a good demand for all choice fresh stock with a further advance in prices. Strictly new laid eastern are firm at 20c. P. E. Island, N. S. and N. B. have been selling well since Monday at 18c.

POTATOES.—Receipts have been much lighter this week, and the market has been working into better shape. For the past three days there has been a steady demand at about 50 to 55 cents for good eastern stock, with extra Houlton Hebrons ranging up to 58c.

POULTRY.—Receipts of western ice had been pretty full this week, especially towards the close, and some lots of chickens had to be closed out yesterday at 10c. Fowls sold at 11 to 12c per lb, the latter for very choice. Northern chickens and fowls in limited supply and steady. Ducks in fair demand. Live fowls have been selling fairly at 11c.; chickens, if choice and large, bring 12c. Ducks steady at 11c.

FISH.—Cod continue in moderate supply, steady demand and firm at quotations. Box herring ruling lower under the liberal supplies. Barrel herring steady. Mackerel coming forward slowly and bringing high prices.
