

When the recently proposed Canada Assistance Plan becomes law it will be one of the most important pieces of social welfare in our time," J.S. White, executive secretary of the Canadian Public Welfare Association, Canadian Welfare Council delegates at the fifth Atlantic Workshop session on Rehabilitation being held at Montgomery Hall, Prince of Wales College on Wednesday.

The plan provides for federal sharing of public assistance costs not previously shared. It is expected that by 1970 the provinces will have available to them about \$115 million a year, most of which they had been spending from their own revenue, to improve welfare programs.

"The provinces will be responsible for the actual implementation of the Canada Assistance Plan," Mr. White said, "and the success or failure of the plan will depend on how they assume their responsibilities and develop their programs."

Mr. White listed some of the causes of dependency: low level of education, automation, racial discrimination, lack of employment opportunities, poor health, poor motivation and family disintegration.

To counteract these causes he suggested career and employment counselling, improved educational and training resources, improved housing, improved development programs, family counselling and research.

Research in particular will help to diagnose the weaknesses of our social and economic structure so that we can discover the proper preventive for the cause."

Mr. White summed up his remarks by suggesting a three-fold plan which he felt held the key to the successful development of the Canada Assistance Plan: fully adequate benefits for people receiving assistance; enlarged, qualified staff and continued research.

A dinner and social rounded out the day's activities, with the concluding sessions scheduled for Thursday at the Prince of Wales College.

Albion Cross Man Is Assessed \$100

GEORGETOWN — Provincial Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, presided at magistrate's court here on Wednesday. The crown was represented by deputy Attorney-General J. Arthur McGuigan, QC.

John Robert MacDonald, Albion Cross, pleaded guilty to illegal possession of 52 undersized lobsters and was fined \$100 and costs or 30 days. He was represented by Vernon J. Fraser.

Eugene Russell, Cable Head East, was fined \$30 and costs or 15 days for possession of 16 undersized lobsters. For possession of 21 undersized lobsters, Gerard Lannigan, Montague, was fined \$40 and costs or 20 days. He was represented by Kenneth R. MacDonald.

Everett James MacLeod, Georgetown, was fined \$15 and costs on each of two charges laid under the Unemployment Insurance Act.

John Beaton, Charlottetown, pleaded not guilty to a charge of driving without due care and attention. His case was adjourned by consent to June 16 for trial. He is represented by Kenneth R. MacDonald.

JAIL TERM

Peter Henry Martell, Georgetown-Royal, pleaded guilty to a charge of selling liquor. Following the crown's proving a previous conviction, he was sentenced to serve three months in jail.

Charles McConnell, Georgetown, was granted an adjournment to June 7 on a charge of selling liquor with no plea being taken.

Harold Hunter, Elmira, represented by Frank Sigsworth, entered a not guilty plea to a charge under the Unemployment Insurance Act and his case was adjourned to Charlottetown on June 6.

Injunction Withdrawn

MONTREAL (CP)—A petition for an injunction to prevent the CBC from holding a television debate between Premier Jean Lesage and Daniel Johnson, leader of the Union Nationale, was withdrawn from Quebec Superior Court Tuesday.

The petition, filed on behalf of Pierre Bourquail, leader of the separatist Rassemblement pour l'Indépendance Nationale, was to prevent the debate from being televised unless an RIN candidate was allowed to participate.

Lawyers representing Mr. Bourquail, in court today, withdrew the petition without comment after CBC lawyers said the debate had already been cancelled.

The proposed debate fell through Sunday when Mr. Johnson's agent refused to accept the time and conditions set for the proposed event by Premier Lesage, leader of the provincial Liberals in the current election campaign. The Quebec general election takes place June 5.

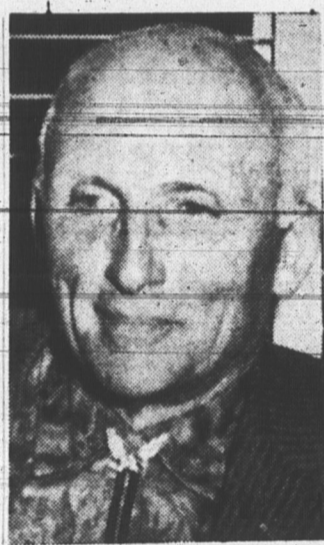
United Fund Directors Approve Appointments

The United Fund Board of Directors, at a meeting held last night, approved the appointment of Edwin C. Johnson as provincial campaign chairman and James G. Wilson as provincial public relations chairman for the United Fund Campaign to be held through September and October of this year.

Mr. Johnson is the former manager of the Dominion Life Assurance Co., and a past president of the Red Cross Society. He is well known for his participation in civic affairs having served as Mayor of Charlottetown for six terms. Mr. Johnson was also associated with the Tourist Association and the Board of Trade.

Mr. Wilson comes to the United Fund with a wealth of experience in the public relations field. He is president and general manager of the island wide firm of real estate brokers, Wilson, Real Estate. A past president of the Real Estate Association of P.E.I. and currently a Canadian associate editor of the association's publications. He is secretary-treasurer of the K-40 club, a member of the Legion and past vice president of the Gale, Ontario branch, a member of the Board of Trade and the P.E.I. Tourist Bureau.

The school enrollment is expected to be between 700 and 750. It is now about 490.

Family-Best Place To Start For Happy Life, Meeting Told

HAMILTON (CP)—Life could be whole, free, creative and joyous, and all humans could be loving, unafraid and happy but the place to start to make this real is with the family, a woman church executive said Wednesday.

Speaking on the third day of the second North American conference on church and family sponsored by the National Council of Churches in the United States, and the Canadian Council of Churches, Cynthia C. Wedel of New York said:

"Looking at Jesus Christ we see a man in whom the self-centredness and self-protectiveness which poisons most human life seemed to be entirely missing."

The associate general secretary of Christian unity of the National Council of Churches told delegates mankind was created free to make choices, to say yes or no; even to turn against his Creator.

However, he was born free because God wanted to share His own quality of love with His creation.

Each of the parties in a love relationship must be able to say no, to refuse the relationship.

But it is self-evident that the finest possibilities of the marriage relationship have often been thwarted by the attitudes of society and the church, she told more than 500 delegates to the convention that ends Friday.

Young people need help in understanding what it can mean to give oneself to another. They must try to see the "deep, essential loneliness" in each other and realize that marriage can alleviate that loneliness.

Dr. Wedel said every really happily married person probably would say that sexual relations are far less important in marriage than what movies, books, advertising and most courses in marriage preparation make them out to be.

"I am inclined to think that today's youth, aided by the pill and antibiotics, so that the old fears of pregnancy and disease are gone, may at last be able to find more of the real meaning of marriage."

"If marriage... can mean a relationship in which you are loved for what you are, rather than for what you accomplish, the family can begin to be a wonderful place for a child. Here he is loved just because he is himself. He may be disciplined when he still loved in the midst of discipline."
