Hogan Is Overwhelmed By Reception

NEW YORK (AP)--The "wee wee mon"--as Ben Hogan became known to Scots at the Carnoustie golf course--melted under the warmth of his reception here Tuesday.

"You just want to cry," Hogan said as he stood in the place of honor at City Hall plaza after receiving a siren-screaming ticker tape parade...

And the grim, hard-bitten master of the fairways choked up. "I am completely bewildered," the wiry Texan added later.

Things began happening for the Hogans shortly after they arrived from Britain where 11 days ago Ben completed a tripple crown by winning the British Open title in his first try.

Previously Hogan--in a sweep compared by some to amateur Bobby Jones' grand slam of 1930--won the Masters with a record score and his fourth United States Open.

At noon a mile-long parade from the lower tip of Manhattan to City Hall--the first such celebration for a golfer since Jones' victorious return from Britain 23 years ago--led to the main welcoming ceremonies.
