Four Cars Figure in Street Crash

A four-car collision occurred in the city yesterday afternoon shortly before 4 p.m. causing fairly extensive damage to at least three of the vehicles. The accident occurred at the intersection of Fitzroy and Hillsboro streets when a 1959 Pontiac driven by Wayne Hamilton of Charlottetown and travelling west on Fitzroy was in collision with a 1962 Chevrolet, driven by Charles F. Lapp of Rochester, N.Y., and travelling north on Hillsboro. The impact reportedly sent the Lapp vehicle into a parked car, owned by Wendie Cadmore of Charlottetown. The Cadmore vehicle was sent smashing into a vehicle parked ahead of it and owned by Charles E. Campbell.

Kirkwood Drive Committee Meets Gov't On Pollution

A committee composed of residents of Kirkwood Drive and surrounding area met with provincial government officials yesterday in regard to the water contamination situation in Charlottetown Harbour. The residents were to put forth recommendations that the government be cleaned up immediately and that daily tests be taken of the water at Kirkwood Drive West. The recommendations were drawn up at a public meeting last Thursday night. Another meeting with government officials is scheduled for later this week and the full report of the results of the two meetings will be given at a public meeting of interested citizens of the area and of Charlottetown on Friday and the Shewan vehicle was travelling north on Prince Street. At 1:15 last night another accident occurred this time at the intersection of Upper Queens and Bayfield streets. The vehicles involved were driven by J. A. Medical authorities at the Charlottetown Hospital yesterday reported that the condition of five-year-old Kirby MacAlister, son of Mr. and Mrs. John "Lety" MacAlister, 7 Bishop Street, is improved. The boy suffered lacerations to the face and a fractured clavicle when struck by an automobile while playing on the street Monday afternoon. The driver of the vehicle, Robert Johnston, Bishop Street, reported to police that he noticed the young lad and another companion playing on the sidewalk, and a short time later it came to his attention that only one boy was on the sidewalk. Mr. Johnston is reported to have heard a boy yelling and clammed on the brakes. It then discovered the boy under his car. It is believed the youngster was dragged some 10 feet before the vehicle was stopped.

Regatta Set For N. Rustico

North Rustico villagers are hoping for fair skies as they plan their annual regatta and lobster supper for this afternoon and evening. This year's regatta, sponsored by the village and school of North Rustico, will begin at 2 p.m. About 50 boats of all types, comprising five or six classes, are expected to be entered in the competition. P.E.I. Lobster To Be Shipped To Holland

Plans are being discussed for the proposed shipment of 12,000 to 15,000 pounds of live lobsters to Holland, provincial marketing director, Reid-Sanders said yesterday. Mr. Sanders said that if the plans were finalized, the shipment will be sold to a firm in Yerscho, Holland, in August. He noted that although the air freight costs would make the lobster price quite high in Holland, a substantial market could be developed if the air shipment is found practical. Cost of shipment will be about 36 cents per pound.
