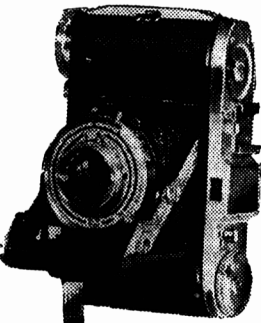

Crapaud Welcomes Back Former Teacher Now Doctor

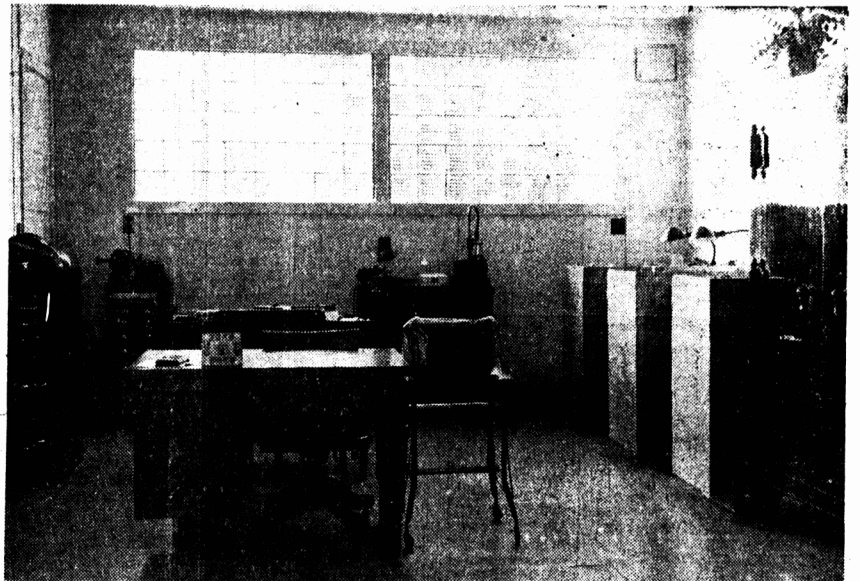
On Thursday, June 11, people of Crapaud and surrounding districts gathered in Crapaud hall to welcome Dr. Peter MacDonald.

Medical Ass'n To Boost Standards Of Practitioners

WINNIPEG, (CP) — The Canadian Medical Association moved Monday to boost the standards of education of general practitioners in Canada.

The general council, meeting at the association's annual convention here, decided to establish a College of General Practitioners. Its aim would be to establish an academic body with broad educational aims; to promote undergraduate teaching by and for general practitioners, and to promote post-graduate education of the same group.

9,000 Doctors Eligible
The college would compare with the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada, which sets standards for medical specialists. It would be similar to the American Academy of General Practice and the College of General Practitioners of the United Kingdom.

Membership will depend upon membership in the CMA, its provincial division and the local medical society. French-speaking doctors must be members of l'Association des Medecins de Langue Francaise du Canada.

It is estimated that more than 9,000 doctors in Canada are eligible. The CMA also confirmed the date of its 1954 annual convention as the week of June 14 in Vancouver.

Divisional annual meetings were arranged as follows: Manitoba, with the CMA convention and business meeting in October; Saskatchewan, Waskesiu, Aug. 26 to 28; P.E.I., Charlottetown, Aug. 31 to Sept. 1; Newfoundland, St. John's, Sept. 3 to 5; New Brunswick, St. Andrews, Sept. 6 to 9; British Columbia, Vancouver, Sept. 21 to 25; Alberta, Edmonton, Sept. 28 to Oct. 2.

The Nova Scotia division, oldest medical association in Canada, will celebrate its 100th anniversary at its meeting Oct. 6 to 9.
