Home Is Continued from page 1 with its membership of five and a half million," she thought. The A.C.W.U. could be a "bridge of understanding," said the traveling editor, and it can be the window through which you can look out beyond the horizons of your own country.

Dr. Miller's color slides demonstrated how the problems of each individual today because "we are all human beings together on the same shrinking planet and that when the bell tolls for one of us, it tolls for all." He showed women being used as beasts of burden in a primitive method for producing food.

"Two-thirds of the world is hungry today and a hungry man is not a rational creature," he said. "It is utterly useless to preach pious platitudes of democracy to starving, ragged and desperate men. It is for the functional research and for the demonstration of known techniques for increasing food and fibre production and improving methods of distribution."

Returns From Coronation Trip

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Began Work

Mr. Howe, who arrived by plane from New Glasgow 4 p.m. yesterday attended the barbecue at the Experimental Farm on his way to the city, accompanied by the Federal candidates, Messrs. Matheson and Miller. He leaves for the mainland by plane this morning.

At the opening of the meeting, which was presided over by Mr. Stewart Ross, one minute of silence was observed in honour of the late Dr. Cyrus MacMillan.

Hon. Dougald MacKinnon, Minister of Public Works and Highways who was the first speaker, stated that the promises made by the Conservative leader were "of desperation." Canada is now in the forefront of the Nations of the world, said MacKinnon, "due to the combination of natural resources and good government, which I hope will continue."

Hon. W. E. Darby, Q.C., Attorney General, spoke briefly pointing out that the problems of government had been dealt with fairly and in harmony with the wishes of the people generally, and that no semblance of scandal had been in evidence during the years of Liberal Government.

Senator Jones said that never in his political experience had he been more optimistic about the result of the forthcoming election. He commended the development of the parliament of Canada by the inclusion of parliamentary assistants to the ministers and the results attained in skill and experience.

He recalled the work of Mr. Howe in securing the best engineer on the continent to bring the docking areas at Borden and Tormentine to the state of perfection now enjoyed, and added "Someone with intelligence should be dealing with the Wood Island situation. It's an awful situation there now."

Mr. Cecil Miller said that political co-operation was necessary from those who should have the interest of the country at heart. Opposition members brought many things to the attention of the government but obtained absolutely nothing. "If you don't get behind the King and go ahead, leaving Queen's out it's time for a change here," he said.

Mr. Neil Matheson spoke briefly and requested co-operation on the part of the electors. He cautioned them against believing any rumors of a rift between the two candidates, a situation which frequently arises in a dual constituency.

Quebec Liberal

Mr. Lapalme had said he would resign the leadership if defeated in the Montreal-Outremont election, the new standing in the 92-seat legislative assembly.

Union Nationale 68; Liberals 23; Independent 1; vacant none. Election of Mr. Lapalme, 46-year-old Joliette, Que., lawyer, was conceded on the basis of returns from 175 of 293 polls.

Later returns, final for the night gave the following figures for 289 of 293 polls: Mr. Lapalme 15,239; Bernard Couvrette UN 10,966; Robert Holland Ind. L. 587; and Norman Nerenberg Lab-Prog 402.

Mr. Lapalme led from the time the first poll reported. In Portneuf, Rosaire Chalifour a Cap Sante business man, also defeated three opponents in retaining the seat for the Union Nationale.

Final figures for the night, for 107 of 135 polls, showed Mr. Chalifour with 8,466 votes; Louis Philippe Bertrand Ind-UN 662; Delphis Marois L. 4,420; and Alexander Paquet Ind. 1,352.

In Matapedia, Clovis Gagnon, a notary, had no trouble retaining the seat for the Union Nationale with 176 polls reported. He had 8,868 votes to 3,533 for Rene de Blois, Liberal, and 105 for Marcel Gregoire, Independent Social Credit.

The paper named no names; it now appears that Beria was meant. The radio broadcast said the decision to drop Beria from the Communist party—which almost certainly means his finish as a govern-
