My Favorite Salad Recipe



JELLIED FRUIT SALAD
by Mrs. J. David Stewart,
wife of the Mayor of Charlottetown.
1 cup diced pineapple
1/2 cup grapes
1/2 cup dates
2 cups pineapple juice (hot)
1 1/2 tablespoons gelatine
1/2 cup cold water
2 tablespoons lemon juice
Soften the gelatine in the cold water and dissolve in the pineapple juice which has been heated. If there are not two cups juice from the can of pineapple make up quantity with water and sugar or lemon or orange juice. Cut grapes in two, cut up dates and wash pineapple add to fruit juice. Pour in mold to chill.
Top with fruit-salad dressing.
