Panthers Split Weekend Action

After losing to the Dalhousie Tigers 2-1 on Saturday, the UPEI Panthers defeated the Acadia Axemen 2-1 on Sunday, gaining a split in weekend's action in Atlantic Universities. Men's Soccer Action played at MacAdam Field in Charlottetown.

On Saturday the Panthers were able to escape the first half as Dalhousie couldn't capitalize on sloppy play by the Panthers. In the second half, the Tigers scored two goals eight minutes within each other and grabbed a 2-0 lead. Goal scorers for the Tigers were Jeff Conater, on a penalty kick, and Miles Page. The Panthers were unwilling to give up without a fight and turned the momentum of the game around. Finally scoring with ten minutes remaining as Locke MacKinnon's cornerkick was drilled into the net by Phillip

Visser. The Panthers continued to press the Tigers for the remainder of the game but were unable to get the equalizer.

On Sunday the Panthers, behind the strong goaltending of Adrian Harrison, defeated the Acadia Axemen 2-1. First half goals by Mike Blanchard and Andrew Bartlett, on a penalty kick gave UPEI a 2-0 lead. The Axemen began to press late in the first half but a number of big saves by keeper Harrison preserved the two goal margin at halftime.

Foul problems which had been plaguing the Panthers against Dalhousie and Moncton struck the Panthers again as Acadia's John Hart scored on an indirect kick. The goal by Acadia changed the momentum of the game for Acadia and they pressed the Pan-

thers for the equalizer. However, the Panthers were able to hold off the Axemen and win the game.

The news was not all good for the Panthers as forward Andrew Barlett was helped off the field early in the second half with a knee injury. Also Miche Blanchard re-injured his shin.

This weekend the Panthers travel to Fredricton for a key game against defending AUAA champ UNB Red Riders on Saturday, and against Mount Alison on Sunday.
