

75 Quebec Firms Are Threatened

QUEBEC (CP) — About 75 Quebec City area firms owned by French-Canadian but using English commercial names have received mimeographed letters threatening them with destruction unless they change their names to French by the end of April.

The letters, postmarked in Quebec, are signed by L'Armée de Libération Québécoise (Quebec Liberation Army), a separatist group.

In Montreal it was reported that last year 130 firms received similar mailed threats and that none was harmed as far as is known and none changed its name.

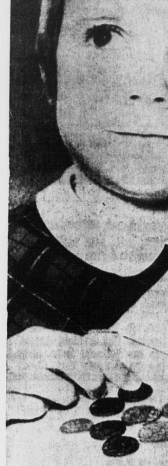

General Election In Autumn May Follow Two Byelections

OTTAWA (CP)—There is a chance the federal government may call two byelections in June, informants said here.

The current proposal is for byelections Monday, June 29, in Nipissing in Ontario and Saskatchewan.

They would be the third and fourth byelections held since the minority Liberal government came to office a year ago. In two others, Feb. 3, the Liberals retained the Montreal seats of Laurier and St. Denis.

The weight of opinion seems to be for by-election in June and a possible general election in the fall. Proponents of this theory say it would give the Liberals a better chance of making gains in the Prairies,

where they were almost blanked last year.

The idea is that the state of Prairie opinion could be felt out in a June byelection in Saskatchewan, made vacant last month by the death of Harry Jones, Progressive Conservative MP since 1957.

The Liberals ran second a year ago in Saskatchewan, a seat they haven't been able to win since.

Nipissing became vacant with the death last month of John R. Garland, revenue minister in the federal cabinet. He held the seat from 1949 and it has been solidly Liberal since 1921.

Current Commons standings are: Liberals 128, Progressive Conservatives 91, New Democrats 17, Creditists 13, Social Credit 11, vacant 2.

Smallwood Says Optimistic On Hamilton Falls Project

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Premier Smallwood said here he was optimistic the proposed Hamilton Falls project at Labrador's Hamilton Falls would commence this year.

In a short statement to the Newfoundland legislature, he said he held several meetings with Premier Jean Lesage and Resources Minister Rene Lesage of Quebec while attending the federal-provincial conference in Quebec City.

He said Hamilton Falls was the subject of the talks. He did not elaborate except to reaffirm his optimism for the project.

In answer to W. J. Browne (PC—St. John's East Exterior), Mr. Smallwood commented on the Hamilton Falls Power Corporation becoming a public stock company as revealed in the Canada Gazette. He said his government had been approached earlier and had given approval.

The premier said the present proportion of ownership—20 per cent by Hydro Quebec and 80 per cent by the British Newfoundland Corporation—would not continue much longer. He did not elaborate.

Mr. Smallwood said turning the company into a public stock company did not necessarily mean shares would immediately be on sale to the public. "You can't buy stock if you no one has any for sale," he said.

Mr. Smallwood also said he expected construction of the proposed pulp mill by Chance, Nfld., to begin this year.

This would be the second mill of its kind to become a reality this year. Three weeks ago he announced a huge kraft pulp mill would be built on the Labrador coast.

There are now two pulp mills in the province—Bowater's Newfoundland Pulp and Paper Mills situated at Corner Brook and the Anglo-Newfoundland Development Company Limited at Grand Falls.

After an angry exchange with an opposition member the premier's notice he would ask the house to form a select committee to investigate allegations against his office in connection with the last provincial election.

Speaking in the throne speech debate, Arthur Murphy (PC—St. John's Centre) said a St. John's storeowner had been

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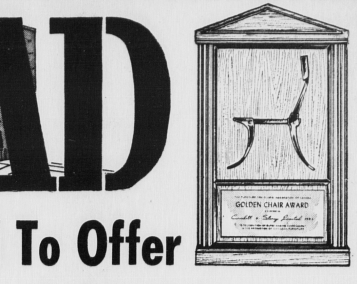
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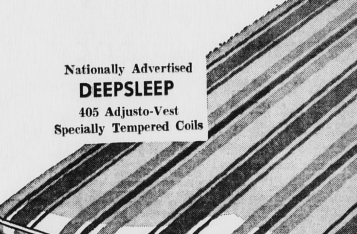
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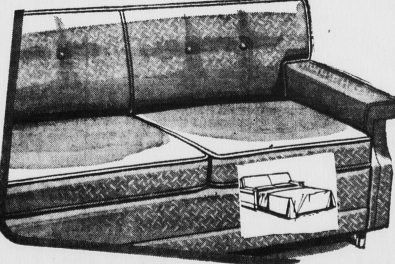


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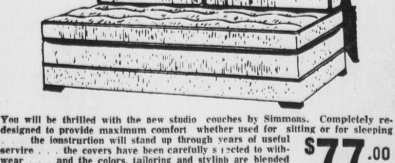
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
