A TEMPERANCE prayer meeting was held last evening in the Baptist Church. The other churches in this city were represented. fervent prayers were offered that the tide of intemperance be stayed, and that the illicit liquor traffic be suppressed. The Rev. Mr. Whitman, in the course of his remarks made the alarming statement that on Sunday last no less than 36 places in this city were dealing out strong drink, and this in defiance of the law of the land. If this is true, and we have no reason to question it, it is certainly high time for the churches to act. We trust these meetings will be continued by the other churches in this city.

THE shipping season at New London since the opening up of navigation was the liveliest known in that vicinity for some years. Over 30,000 bushels of potatoes were shipped, principally to the Boston market, and fully 40,000 bushels of oats to Newfoundland and Provincial markets. The price paid for potatoes by buyers, averaged 25 cents, and for oats, 40 cents per bushel. The largest traders were:—S. H. Brown & Co., shipped 8,000 bushels potatoes, and 16,000 bushels oats; J. A. Squarbridge, 8,000 bushels potatoes, and 10,000 bushels oats; McMillan & Garrett, 5,000 bushels oats; G. R. Garrett, 6,000 bushels oats, 3,000 bushels potatoes; John Stewart, 8,000 bushels potatoes.

THE HOWELL CASE.

Great Interest Manifested in the Proceedings.

SUMMERSIDE, June 19. The trial of Howell commenced this morning. The court room was packed and great interest manifested in the proceedings. Hodgson, Q. C., for prisoner, challenged a large number of jurors. The jury was finally sworn in with Mr. William Dennis, Foreman. McLeod, Q. C., opened case for Crown. Mary Blackmore, the first witness, was severely cross-examined by Mr. Hodgson. The widow of the deceased, Emma Wallace, is now under cross-examination.

Northcote vs. Bright.

LONDON, June 19. In the House of Commons Sir Stafford Northcote called the attention of the Government to the speech of Mr. John Bright, in which Mr. Bright referred to the Conservative Party in a most insulting manner. Mr. Bright was alleged to say that the Conservatives formed the obstructionist party in the House, and that they were allied with Irish rebels to delay the business of the country. Mr. Bright replied in a vigorous speech to Sir Stafford. He defended the language used on the occasion, and said that his statement was justifiable and borne out by facts.

Austrian Intervention.

VIENNA, June 19. An Albanian envoy has arrived here, to ask for Austrian intervention in order to suppress a revolt which threatens to assume considerable proportions.

Newspaper Suppressed.

LONDON, June 19. The Madrid Globe has been suppressed for publishing scandalous reports concerning the Queen.

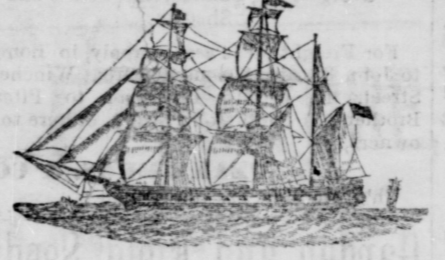
