

Reckless Driver Fined \$50 in Police Court

Found guilty to reckless driving, Stanford Jardine, Charlottetown, was fined \$50 and costs on 26 days in jail by Magistrate A. J. Haslam in city police court yesterday. The incident took place at about 11 p.m. Monday night.

The informing police officer, Cpl. Keith Wakeley in his testimony, revealed that before he had managed to get the accused stopped, he was forced to chase him over close to a mile of city streets, and at one time, when he was able to clock the speed of the accused's vehicle, he recorded it at 60 m.p.h.

ROUTE OF CHASE

The chase started near Queen Street, west and went on Fitzroy, north on Rockford, west on Euston and the accused did not slow down for the stop sign at Rockford and Euston, and also went over the sidewalk along over the lawn in front of Euston.

From there the chase continued west on Brighton, north on Anbrosie, west on Churchill, north on Greenfield, and finally ended when the police officer was able to halt the accused at the intersection of Greenfield and Villa Avenue. Counsel for the defence was Lester P. O'Donnell.

Before passing sentence the magistrate said "one" a maniac would drive through the streets of the city at such a high speed.

Crown testimony was commented in the case of James Bruce, New Arxyle and the accused was remanded until June 10, on the charge of the theft of money, exceeding \$50, the property of Althel Ellis, Charlottetown. Counsel for the defence is John J. Holmes, and for the crown Alan K. Sealer.

Dunphy Is Planning To Visit Every Home In Kings County

Tommy Dunphy, Eastern Canada's youngest political candidate, is setting a pace as he campaigns through Kings County. The 24-year-old New Democrat had visited more than 2,000 homes up to Monday and he expects to cover the three remaining polls in the Bay Fortune and Souris River areas prior to polling day, he said yesterday.

Mr. Dunphy calls at every home, regardless of political affiliation, and averages from 15 to 18 calls a day, he said, which is a blistering pace compared with most political campaigning experience. He works from 8.30 in the morning until 11.30 at night, Mr. Dunphy said.

"I try to average about five to six minutes to a call," said the likable young man who is an agricultural college graduate, and worked with the Nova Scotia department of agriculture and the Nova Scotia exhibition coming back to the island to combine the duties of the party's provincial organizer and candidate for Kings County.

Renovations Are Slated For Jails

Attorney General Melvin McQuaid said yesterday that renovations of the province's three county jails are to start at once.

At the last session of the Legislature, money was appropriated to repair the jails.

Mr. McQuaid said yesterday that repairs would be "extensive" and will begin on the Kings County Jail at Georgetown. The plan is to do one jail at a time," he said.

The department of public works has begun plans on the type of renovations needed on the Georgetown jail. According to Mr. McQuaid there will be a "general fixing up with new floors and proper lighting installed and the jails will be redecorated."

Amalgamation Study Group Chairmen Meet Next Week

Judge C. St. Clair Trainor, chairman of the overall committee studying the feasibility of four outlying areas amalgamating with Charlottetown, said Monday that arrangements are being made for the committee and various sub-committee chairmen who are studying phases of amalgamation to meet next week.

Judge Trainor said it is hoped that Municipal Affairs Minister J. David Stewart will be able to attend the meeting so that advice of his department will be available.

Seven sub-committees have been set up and several have already submitted progress reports on their investigations. The sub-committees are finance and taxation, education, water and sewer, streets and street services, planning and zoning, fire protection and police protection.

Judge Trainor said recently that it will likely be fall before the committees have completed their investigations and a report, containing recommendations, drawn up for submission.
