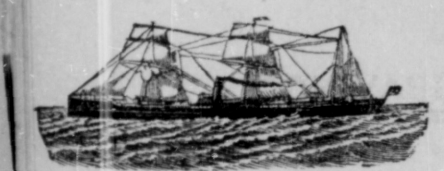

AN OPEN LETTER

To the Hon. Donald Farquharson.

SIR,—The hand writing on the wall plainly reveals that you have been weighed in the balance and found wanting. You are not worthy of being styled a statesman. The House of Assembly ensures almost to every inhabitant of this Province an opportunity to make known his grievances; but it would be useless for an official dismissed without cause or complaint to go before you or your cabal for redress. It is useless for the temperance and other moral reformers to appeal to you who, like Judas Iscariot, sold them for the thirty pieces of silver. People were clamouring to have you appointed as Lieut. Governor, and even Presbyterians were foolish enough to write letters in your behalf. There are none now left to do you honor, and the governorship nor any other position will never be within your grasp.

The choice you have made has fixed your doom. But your squandering and other propensities should be stopped. By your Hillsborough Bridge law you have now saddled the country with four hundred thousand dollars, which, added to the already large debt of six hundred thousand dollars, leaves this Province irrevocably sunk below the redemption of any taxes that can ever be levied in this Province. The people are above you, and they have a duty to perform. If you were in New York you would be arraigned before a tribunal and told to get down and out. It will come to this that unless you resign and retire to private life a movement like the old Tenant League will overtake you.

You delight to be styled Premier. But your reign will be of short duration. The second district will never elect you again. Your colleague despises you, although you try to buy him with a trip to England. You were untrue to your former leader, Mr. Peters, and you were in high dudgeon because Mr. Warburton was chosen. Your temperance principles did good duty then, and you thought you would immerse or submerge Mr. Warburton by your temperance wave. The affairs of this province are in a deplorable condition, and you are not honest enough to give us the exact debt up to the first July next. If a Conservative had done what you did, how loudly you would dilate upon and parade your temperance views to the country. But true to your instincts, and the instincts of the Grit party, its a matter of history now that they have gone back on all their pre-election speeches and promises. Truly you have been styled the organized hypocrite, and for the sake of power showed what a traitor knaves you are as a party; making promises in Opposition for the sake of gaining power and then denying them or refusing to fulfil them. How long do you expect people to tolerate you? Your intriguing and connivance leaves Fort Augustus district without a representative. The Speaker's mouth is muzzled, and you drive him to obey you in your unworthy schemes. Don't imagine that your conduct is not to be reviewed, and the first opportunity on the hustings you will soon be consigned to your merited reward. The man who gallops headlong through crowded streets is punished for his reckless disregard for other men's safety, though the hoofs of his horse may have failed to inflict any actual injury. A menagerie keeper would be arrested if not lynched for turning a city into a pandemonium by letting loose his bears and hyenas, and for the same reason no man should be permitted to turn himself into a wild beast. Virtue must come from within, says Professor Newman; but virtue may come from without. The care of the statesman is to hinder this, as prevent on is better than cure. I is more mockery, says Cardinal Manning, to ask us to put down drunkenness by moral and religious means when the legislature facilitates the multiplication of the incitements to intemperance on every side.

The overtaxed citizens of Charlottetown should call upon you to pay your license fee to the city treasury in the meantime, and the city legislature should call upon you as well as the country to summon the Legislature and have your law repealed. All civilized nations have recognized not only the right but the duty of legislative authorities to adopt the most stringent measures for the prevention of contagious diseases, yet all epidemics taken together have not caused half as much loss of life and health as the plague of intemperance. A restrictive law will drive the man traps from the public streets. It will save our boys from a hundred temptations. It will restore peace and plenty to thousands of homes. If you were a statesman you would look beyond your narrow field of vision. Go and read about prohibition in Sweden. The nation rose and fell, grew prosperous and happy, or miserable and degraded, as its rulers and law makers restrained or permitted the manufacture and sale of that which all along the track of its history has seemed to be the nations greatest curse. Ponder over these things. The fossils that are associated with you I will notice later on.

FOUND IN LONDON TOWER

Iron and Stone Shot--Bones and Bits of Armour.

LONDON, June 3.—Universally interesting and valuable discoveries have been made in the Tower of London. In the process of laying the foundation for the erection of a new guard room near the White Tower, the workmen cut the Roman wall of the second century, and found a number of perfectly preserved tiles of a diffusion of hot air from the hypocaust. The tiles are excellent specimens. They measure 15 inches in length, 6 1/2 inches in width, and 4 1/2 inches in depth.

While removing the mud from the sub-way leading to the river and the moat the workmen discovered a number of iron and stone shot, left, it is believed, at the time of the conflicts between the Royal troops and the rebels under Wyatt in the time of "Bloody Mary" in 1554.

The shot are set in a conglomerate of mud and gravel, thickly beset with human bones and bits of armour, showing firing with deadly effect at close quarters. These are notable discoveries.

The Situation Serious.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 3.—Brigadier-General King, who returned home from Manila on the transport City of Puebla, on account of ill health, in an interview says:—"The situation in the Philippines is most serious. The people of those islands will keep up a guerrilla warfare and there is no telling when the hostilities will cease. When they are whipped they retire to the jungles. Subsisting on practically nothing. They have no need for a base of supplies. It will necessitate a large force of men to subjugate them completely. The war in the Philippines is by no means ended."

NEWS NOTES

It will cost \$8 000 and require 20 days' time to repair the injuries sustained by the Brooklyn in touching the bottom of New York harbour off the Battery, on Decoration Day.

An eccentric Michigan man who died a few days ago was buried in a coffin painted a bright red, which for two years he kept in his dooryard, marking the spot where he wished to be buried. He also had a headstone prepared, on which was inscribed the following: "Here lies the body of William Decker, who had always paid 100 cents on the dollar."

AN ENOCH ARDEN

Foley Drops in on Mrs. O Dowd, Who Used to his Wife.

MANCHESTER, N. H., June 3.—After fourteen years' absence, Thomas Foley long believed to be dead, has come back to his home in this city to find he was married and the mother of two children of whom John O'Dowd is the father. Foley has been all over the world since he disappeared, had been in the army and navy and has seen some exciting happenings, having participated in the battle of Manila on one of Admiral Dewey's ships.

Coming here he sought out the little family he had left behind. Old friends told him everybody had considered him dead and buried long ago; that his wife a hard-working woman, had long since become resigned to her husband's fate and had married John O'Dowd, an employe of one of the mills.

Foley was surprised, but he was reasonable; in fact, he called on the O'Dowds in their little tenement, on South Elm Street. His wife was astounded at the appearance of the supposed dead man. He was received with hospitality and introduced to the second husband. Mutual explanations were offered and accepted.

Mrs. O'Dowd said her husband's death was chronicled in the papers, and she saw the announcement of it herself on a newspaper bulletin board. Foley's friends as well as her own, believed him dead.

When Foley went away his wife was the mother of four children, two of whom have since died. By her second husband Mrs. O'Dowd is the mother of two more children.

Foley, who was born in Ireland, came to Manchester in 1882. Three years later, after a slight difficulty with his wife, he left the city. She received two or three letters from him afterwards, and then all communication ceased.

He says he does not propose to make any trouble over his wife's second marriage, and after remaining here a few days will bid his friends good-bye and live out his life elsewhere.

IT WAS NO JOKE.

But Caused the Death of Frank McGill

PATERSON, N. J., June 3.—Frank McGill died suddenly in the carboxe of the Paterson railroad company Sunday night. It was given out at the time that heart disease caused his death, but investigation indicates that he died as a result of a practical joke, and was shocked to death with electricity. Jos. Grant and Christopher Ashfield, who were also employed at the carboxe, were arrested on charges of manslaughter. County Physician McBride made the autopsy and says the indications are that death was caused by shock, but of what nature he is not prepared to say until the investigation is more complete.

Grant admits that a practical joke was played on McGill. A live wire was run into the soft soap tub, with the intention that, when the men went to the tub for the purpose of taking out a handful of soap to wash their hands, they would receive a slight shock. The wire used however, appears to have been of high tension, and when McGill took out a handful of soap he was, it is said, shocked to death. The front of the tub was wet and this is supposed to have completed the circuit. Grant says that Ashfield had nothing to do with the affair, beyond knowing that the tub was charged.

Japanese Spies Executed.

SEATTLE, June 3.—According to Oriental papers received by the Kinshi Maru, Japan is much aroused over the reports from Shanghai, that twelve Japanese spies had been captured by Russians at a place called To-sang, presumably on Liao Tang peninsula. Particulars of the affair were meagre, but it is understood that the spies were executed in a fortress without a trial.

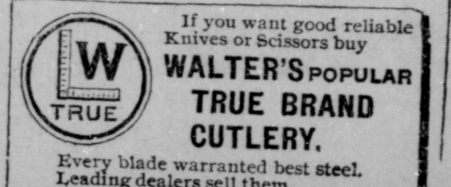
