Tignish Fishermen Favor Tighter Lobster Controls

TIGNISH—Importance of protecting small lobsters to insure the future of the province's valuable lobster fishery was emphasized at a meeting of district lobstermen in the parish hall here Friday evening.

The meeting was conducted by G. J. Gillespie, Maritimes information officer of the department of fisheries, Halifax, who told the fishermen that proper management of the lobster fishery was the only guarantee for its future. Assisting at the meeting were Warren Farrar, officer-in-charge of the department's land and sea protection forces in the province, and Protection Officer Lee Darrah, both of Charlottetown.

Mr. Gillespie stressed that, while the department's protection service was doing its utmost to enforce fishery regulations, one-hundred per cent effective management of the fishery was possible only with the full cooperation of the fishermen themselves.

SMALL MINORITY

"There is a small minority of fishermen in this province who continually flout regulations," he said, adding that such disregard for the law was not acting only to the detriment of the illegal-fishermen themselves but also to that of the legitimate lobstermen.

The Halifax spokesman said there was growing evidence that the majority of Maritime fishermen were favoring tighter restrictions on the lobster fishery. Many of the fishermen were advocating larger legal size limits as well as restrictions on the number of traps. The latter measure has been undertaken in some parts of the Maritimes with much success, Mr. Gillespie said.

EXPRESS CONCERN

Spokesmen for the fishermen at the meeting expressed grave concern about the future of the industry. One veteran fisherman said, "all of us must cooperate if lobstering is to continue as a profitable business. Both our small lobsters and the egg-bearing females must be protected. Any sensible man can see what is happening to

the fishery when small lobsters are being taken even before they reach the egg-bearing stage. I think our courts are too lenient with fishermen who break the regulations. I can't see how the industry is going to go on if the fishing of 'shorts' isn't stamped out altogether."

That fishermen's views were generally shared by the meeting. Wilson Shea, manager of Tignish Fisheries Limited, emphasized that only through proper management—rigid controls against illegal fishing—could the future of the lobster industry be assured.

IS QUESTIONED

Mr. Farrar took part in the general discussion and outlined what the protection service was doing to protect the fishery. He was questioned on some of the regulations, particularly on the boundary line dividing the spring and summer lobstering seasons on the island. "Summer fishing grounds take in" he said, "the area on and along the coast or the waters thereof of that portion of the Strait of Northumberland between a straight line on the northwest drawn from Eel River, Kent County, N.B., to a point in the Gulf of St. Lawrence five marine miles north magnetic from North Point Light, P.E.I. thence in a straight line to North Point Light, P.E.I., and a straight line on the southeast from Victoria Harbor, Queens County, P.E.I. to Bergman's Point, Cumberland County, N.S."

SUMMERSIDE—The preliminary service of the Sixteenth Assembly of the Maritime District Church of the Nazarene was held last Wednesday in the Church of the Nazarene in Summerside. The District Superintendent, Rev. Bruce Taylor, presided. Words of welcome were expressed by Mayor Currie. Reports were given by the elders from the local churches of the district.

Highlight of Thursday afternoon proceedings was the report of District Superintendent Rev. Bruce Taylor concerning the activities over the past year. Following this report, Rev. The feeling of unity and confidence in the district leader was shown by extending to him a three-year call following his re-election.

AGRICULTURAL ESSAY CONTEST WINNERS

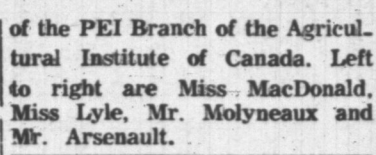

TRUCK OWNED BY S'SIDE STREET DEPT.

Child Killed Instantly When Struck By Truck

SUMMERSIDE — Four-year-old Norman Louis Gallant, son of Mr. and Mrs. Vincent Gallant, 323 Central Street, Summerside, was killed almost instantly about 3 p.m. yesterday when struck near his home by a half-ton truck owned by the Street Department of the Town of Summerside. It was said to have been driven by the department foreman, George Morrison, of Poplar Avenue.

The accident occurred on Central Street North very near to the Pe Road intersection, while the little fellow, accompanied by his eight-year-old sister, Diane, were walking to their home only two houses from a store they had just left.

According to persons in the nearby store whose attention was drawn to the fatality by the sound of a scream, the driver of the truck stopped the vehicle, got out and looked at the dead child, and then proceeded in to Summerside presumably to report the accident to police.

Pending investigation of the accident by the R.C.M.P. the truck involved in the accident has been impounded.

Dr. Henry Moysie who was summoned to the scene pronounced the child dead on his arrival.

Coroner Dr. W.E. Callaghan was also called to the scene of the fatality, and empanelled a coroner's jury composed of Dixon Cousins, Joseph Marchand, Arnold Easton, Harold MacRae, Arthur Lightfoot, all members of the R.C.A.F., Arthur Pratt and George Wotton, both of Summerside.

Mr. Gallant, father of the deceased child, is a life underwriter with the North American Life Insurance Company. Mrs. Gallant before marriage was Stella Peters, of Duvar. They have four other children, Richard, age 12; David, 10; Digne, 8; and Donald, 2.

The funeral will be held on Wednesday at 11 a.m. at St. Paul's Church. Interment will be in the church cemetery.

Seven Injured At Forest Hill

Seven people were taken to Kings County Memorial Hospital as a result of a head-on collision shortly before midnight Friday night.

A Consul car owned and operated by Edward MacIntyre, Lorne Valley, collided at an intersection near Forest Hill with a Vanguard car owned and driven by Wallace MacDonald, Forest Hill. Both cars were badly damaged in the head-on collision.

There are thought to have been five in the Consul and two in the Vanguard. They were taken to Kings County Memorial Hospital, Montague, where all were kept under observation but none are reported in critical condition.

Herman MacDonald sustained a fractured pelvis; Arthur Stead, a severe shaking up; Wallace MacDonald, cuts about the head and face and a shaking up. He is under observation for internal injuries.

Princeton Seminary Choir Will Sing At Summerside

SUMMERSIDE — The Summerside Presbyterian Church will be host to the world famous Princeton Seminary Choir on Thursday evening, July 16th, at 8:15 p.m.

The choir is on its fourteenth annual summer tour, including five Canadian provinces and ten of the north-eastern United States. Their only appearance on Prince Edward Island will be at Summerside.

The male chorus consisting of 20 college graduates, now enrolled at Princeton Theological Seminary, Princeton, N.J., for three years preparation for entering the Christian ministry, forms a cross section of the Seminary's student body whose 300 members represent every American state, 30 foreign countries and 60 church denominations.

The choir has appeared often on major radio and television networks, and can be heard on long playing records. In the past 25 years, it has sung more than three thousand times outside of Princeton, and has appeared in

more than two thousand different churches, schools, civic clubs, hospitals, youth assemblies, and military bases.

Choir director is David Hugh Jones, Mrs. Doc. FAGO, ASCAP, professor of music in the Seminary. He was a charter member of the Westminster Choir College faculty, and head of the organ and composition departments of that school for many years. Dr. Jones is known as a composer of sacred music editor of the Hymnbook, which is published by five Presbyterian and Reformed denominations, and is the music editor for the new American Armed Forces Hymnal, released in March.

The repertoire of the choir includes work of such composers as Handel, Mendelssohn, Bach and Palestrina, as well as contemporary European and American composers and several traditional songs.

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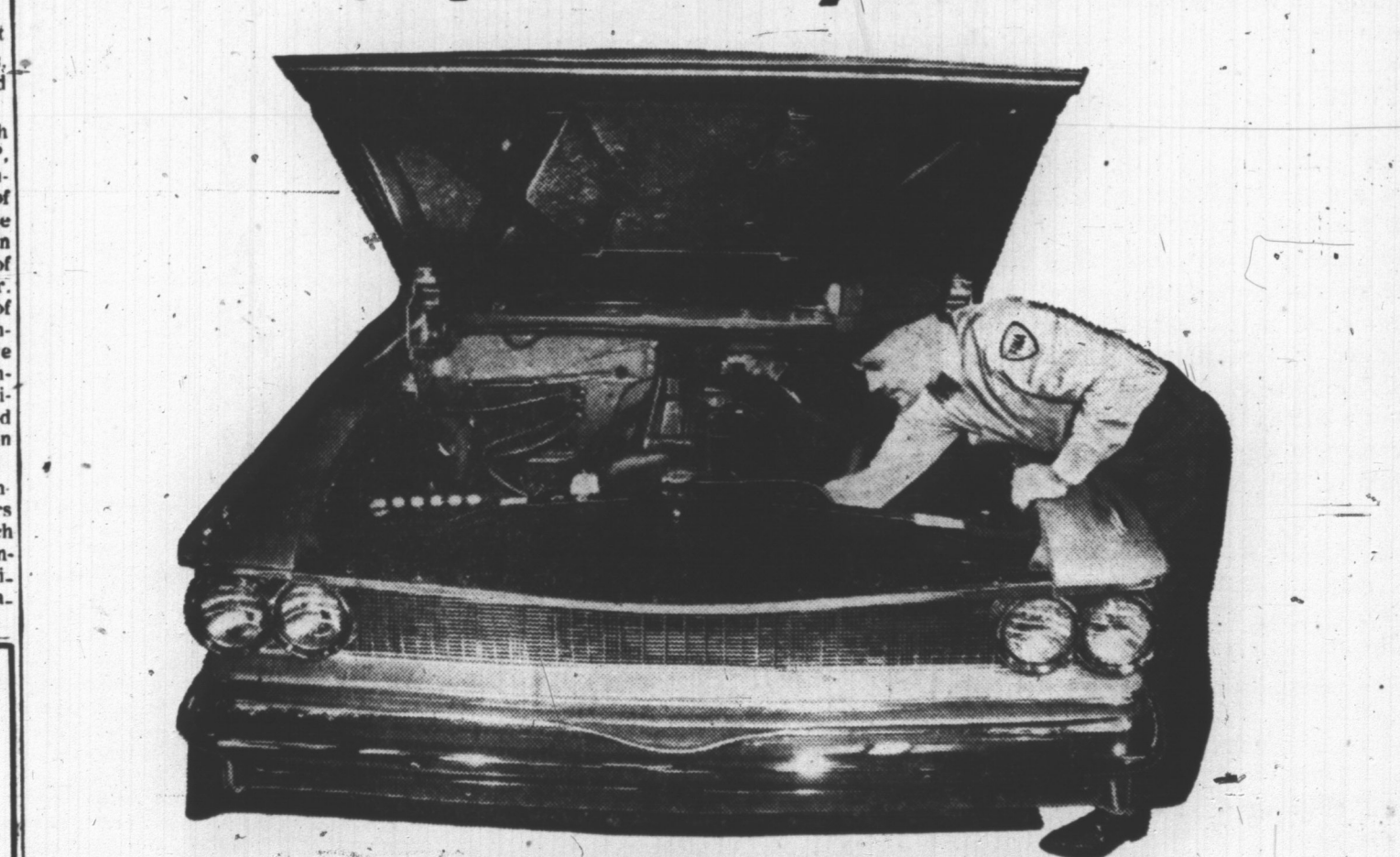
