## PC Candidates Address Meeting

A. Walthen Gaudet, 5th Queen's Progressive Conservative candidate, in the forthcoming provincial election, told a meeting in the Sherwood Hall last evening that he and his colleague J.T. Davies, Sr. were elected to the provincial legislature next Monday they would work for a greater appreciation by government for municipal life and problems.

Mr. Gaudet said that up to the present, governments in this province have been rural oriented. He said this is necessary since the creative wealth in the province comes from the farming and fishing industries, but he added government's should show more concern for residents of the cities, towns and villages.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says few clouds were reported in the Maritimes late Tuesday evening.

A weather system, now crossing Southern Quebec, will enter Northern New Brunswick this morning and pass through Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island tonight. Cloud, showers and isolated thundershowers will accompany the system through the district.

Temperatures will reach close to the 80-degree mark in many inland localities of Nova Scotia today. Clouds in New Brunswick will keep temperatures there much cooler than Tuesday.

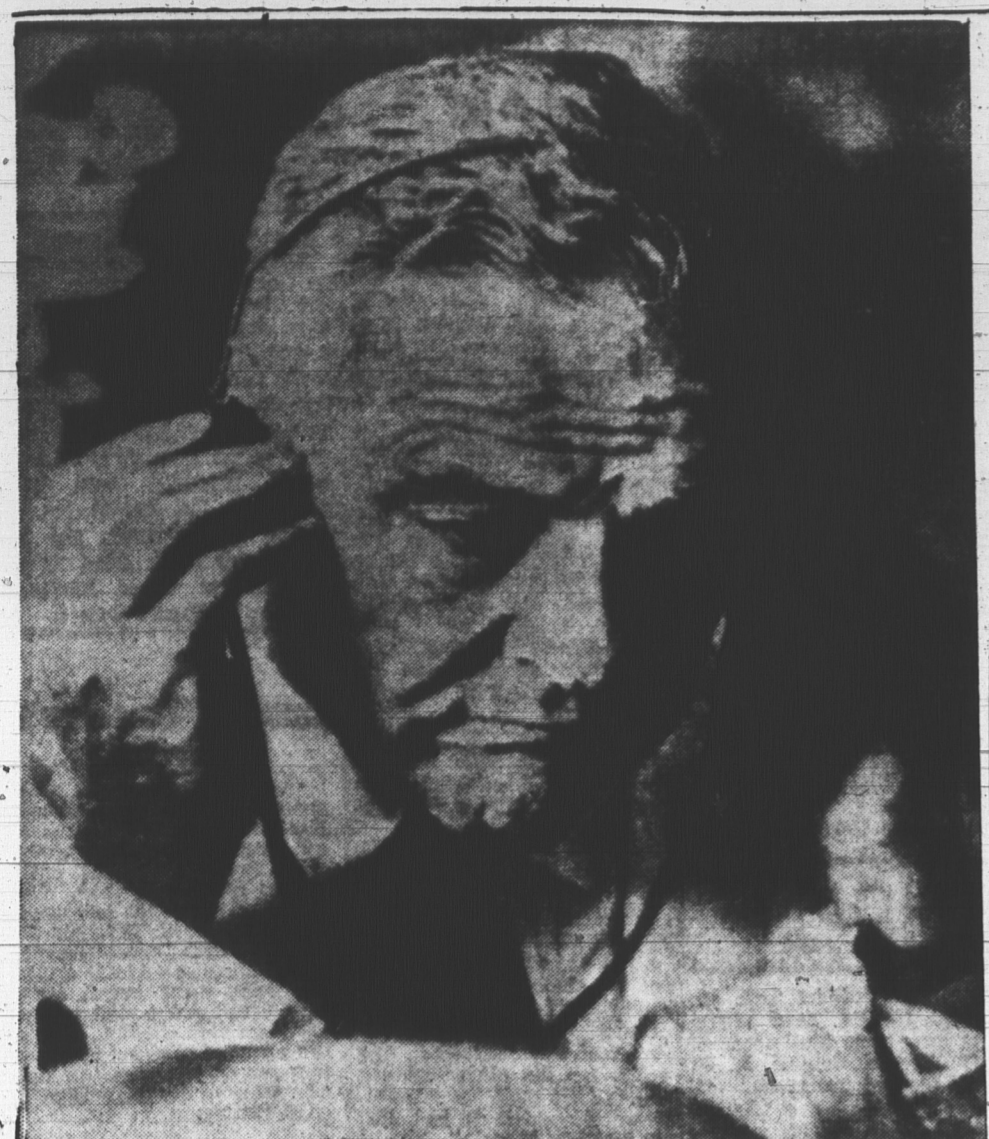

## Island Court's Full Bench Adjourns For Judgment

An appeal by Commonwealth Ltd. and Commonwealth International Corporation against a March 14th decision by Mr. Justice R.R. Bell was heard yesterday before Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell, Mr. Justice Mark

R. McGuigan and Mr. Justice G. J. Tweedy in the Supreme Court of P.E.I. The case was adjourned for judgment.

The decision of Mr. Justice Bell ordered the companies to hold their annual meetings in Toronto, outlined the rules of procedure for the meetings and named the chairman for the meetings.

Counsel for the companies, Robert A. Davies, QC of Toronto, Thomas Allen of Toronto and Gerald Foster QC of Charlottetown, have submitted 12 grounds for appeal.

APPEAL GROUNDS The grounds they offer are: (1) The Court was without jurisdiction to make the said order; (2) The Court ought not to have entertained the said application while legal proceedings between the parties in relation to the annual meetings of the Respondent Corporations were pending in the Superior Court of the district of Montreal and judgment awarded therein; (3) It was not practicable to call or conduct the meetings of the Respondent Corporations according to the Letters Patent and By-Laws; (4) The annual meetings of the Corporations if held pursuant to

Rivermere Dainty Flo has completed nine lactations producing 102,374 lbs. milk, 4,018 lbs. fat in 3,313 days. As a 6-year-old she produced 14,610 lbs. milk, 590 lbs. fat. She is classified Very Good and her sire is Kirkside Chum.

## J.L. MacLeod 40,000 Canadians Affected Dies Suddenly By Talks On Steel Contract

MONTAGUE — The death occurred at his home in Montague on Tuesday May 23rd, of John L. MacLeod in his 61st year. The late Mr. MacLeod had not been in the best of health for several years however a few days ago he became suddenly ill and passed away unexpectedly. He was born at Caledonia, moved to Iris where he went to school. He served with the Royal Canadian Artillery in the Second World War joining the army in September 1939 and was discharged November 13th, 1945. He was married to the former Catherine Ethel Campbell of Alliston who survives him. Also surviving are four sons, Elwood, Allison; Edward, Camp Gagetown; Lawrence and Johnny at Montague.

His mother Mrs. Joseph MacLeod also survives him. One daughter Althea, predeceased him four years ago. Three brothers Stewart of Montague, Stanley of Heatherdale and Earl of Charlottetown, and sisters Lois Buell of Montague and Christie Mrs. Fred MacRae of Charlottetown, Eden; Mrs. Carl MacKenzie of Vancouver; Annie, Mrs. Angus Matheson, also survive him.

HAMILTON (CP)—More than 40,000 Canadian union members are expected to be affected by negotiations under way or soon to start as the United Steelworkers of America (USWA) moves into its big contract year.

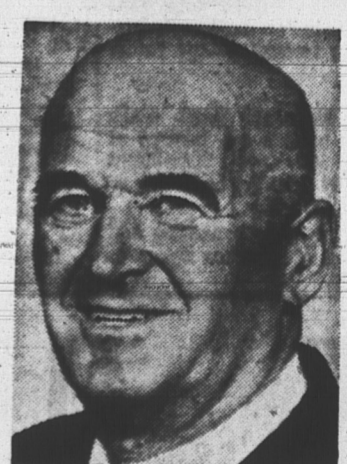
