Building Permits Set S'ide Record

The total value of building permits issued in Summerside during the period from January 1st to September 30th this year is \$1,771,000 a record high. There were 128 residential permits issued, these include the

100 units of the Hillcrest housing development, with a total value of \$1,163,000 six commercial permits were granted and these had a value of \$608,000. Construction has been at a record peak during the past year but is expected to taper off during the next few months.

Pope Road Man Injured In S'ide

A Pope Road man, Percy Weeks, was hospitalized last evening after being injured by a

Volkswagen car which is reported to have roared away from the scene at a fast speed, leaving Mr. Weeks lying injured on the street at the intersection of Water and St. Stephen streets. The accident occurred about 8 p.m. last evening.

The hit-and-run accident was witnessed by another motorist who reported the incident to Cst. Elmer Matheson on traffic duty nearby. After regaining consciousness Mr. Weeks was taken to Prince County Hospital in a state of shock and suffering from lacerations to head, hand and nose.

His condition was not considered serious but he was detained in hospital overnight. X-rays will be taken this morning to determine if he received more serious injuries than were at first indicated.

tural resources headed by Hon. Leo Rossiter who is making every effort to provide "new and improved services of benefit to the province."

The Souris Line Road group of boys and girls, with ages ranging between 9 and 15, will meet on the last Friday of each month.

Their purpose is to "promote good forestry management and give youth an insight into the planting of revenue producing trees on otherwise unproductive farmland."

The projects of such a club are two-fold: (a) the study of forestry principles that may be applied to a farm woodlot and the planting of forest trees for plantations and windbreaks, and (b) to mark for thinning and improving a half-acre plot of woodland (83 feet in radius or 147 feet square) or plant and care for a minimum of 100 trees as a windbreak, shelter-belt or snow hedge, or plant with forest trees a minimum of one-quarter acre plot of land on the farm.

OFFICIAL VISITS

Once the projects are under way visits will be made by the provincial foresters to inspect it and notes taken and points awarded. These points will be made on the basis of 300 points for field score; 100 points for field notes; the club member's own record of work done; 200 points for exhibits at club Achievement Day; 100 points for identification, competition (identification of forest tree leaves and twigs); 200 points for questions based on club work, farm forestry and forest tree planting; 100 points for attendance at meetings.

Sept. 12. Later, the CPR announced complete cancellation of the Gull and its direct passenger service between Saint John and Boston effective Oct. 25. Howard Mann of Moncton, executive manager of the Maritime Transportation Commission, said granting of the discontinuance application by the Maine Railways would mean the end of all rail passenger traffic between the Atlantic area and New England.

The CPR said the Gull cancellation was made necessary by insufficient passenger traffic. Tentative arrangements have been made for passenger travel to Boston via Vancoboro, Me. with Vancoboro as transfer point but this would also terminate if the MCR application was granted.

LOSING \$6,000 DAILY

MCR has revealed a daily loss of \$6,000 on its passenger operations. President E. Spencer Miller said if the railway gets permission to drop passenger service, it will guarantee improved freight, mail and express services. Elimination of the passenger service would leave only bus, plane or private cars as transportation means into Maine from the Atlantic area. The MTC has studied bus schedules and found them "not too convenient" but indicated they could be adjusted. Northeast Airlines has rights to fly between Saint John and Portland, Me. but has not exercised them. Trans-Canada Airlines flies into Boston from Saint John.

Father MacGillivray closed the meeting with the Act of Consecration. The entertainment committee served refreshments.

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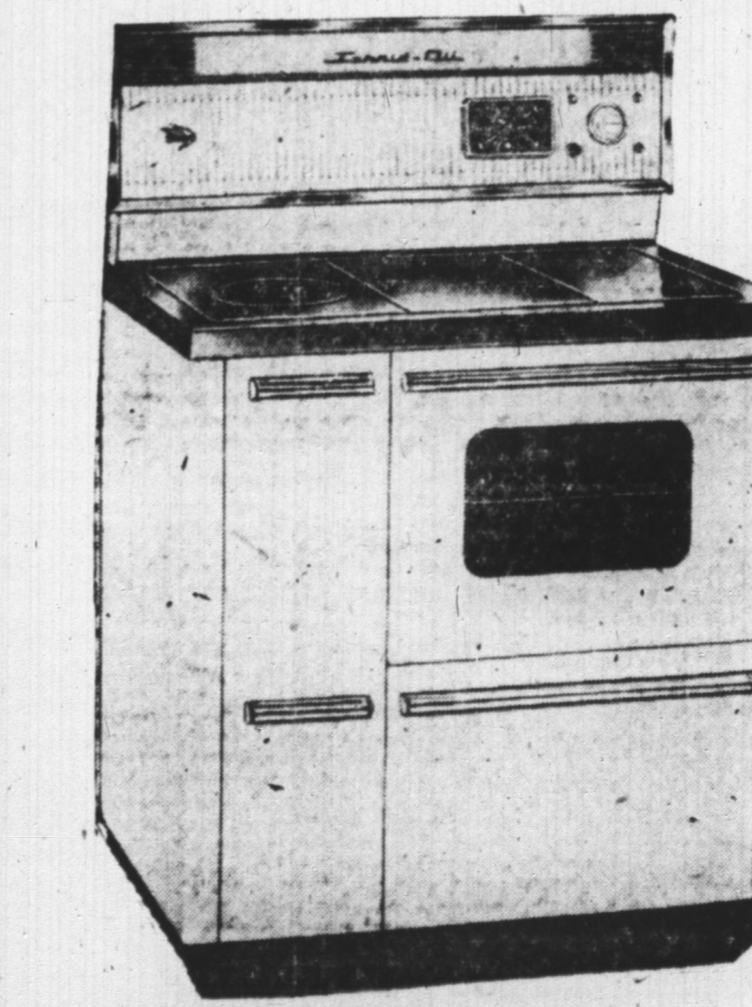
