Abbies Defeat Pontiacs 3-2

The Charlotte Abbies scored all their runs in the third and fourth innings, Sunday and held back a Summerside rally for a 3-2 victory over the western crew.

Vern Handrahan, the pitching star of one of the games in Summerside was at it again Sunday, pitching a seven hitter, while striking out ten and walking only two. Al Stewart turned in a good performance on the mound for the Pontiacs but the Abbies got to him for one run in the third and two more in the fourth, that was all Handrahan needed as he stopped the Pontiacs on just four hits and one run the rest of the way.

Maurie Cannon the batting star of Saturday's game, went hitless Sunday but he turned in a sparkling field play, making a beautiful grab of Buck Whitlock's drive to the right of first base, to keep the Abbies from scoring at least one more run.

Irv MacKinnon, wielded the big bat for the Abbies blasting out three hits in four trips to the plate, and driving in two of the Abbies three runs.

The Abbies now hold a 3-2 series lead and need only one more victory to win the Island Senior Baseball Championship.

Donnie Simmons pitched a two-hit shut-out against the Charlotte Abbies at Queen Elizabeth Park in Summerside Saturday afternoon, and MacLennan Motors Pontiacs defeated the visitors by the score of 2-0 evening up the series for the Island Senior Baseball Championship at two games apiece. Simmons struck out eleven, and issued only

one walk, and his mates performed brilliantly behind him in posting the victory. Donnie MacLennan, Abbies pitcher, also pitched the kind of ball that would win most games, allowing only four safe blows striking out eight and walking five. All the scoring took place in the second inning. With one out, Kip Ready dropped a throw at first, giving Joe Bernard a life, and Maurice Cannon hit one of the longest balls ever seen at the Summerside diamond, chasing Bernard around the paths in front of him. For Charlotte, Jack Kane had a double, and Ken MacDonald, a single. Besides Cannon's four-base blow, Joe Dalton hit a double, and Dave Brophy had two singles in three trips.

Joe Dalton's beautiful running catch of Johnny LeClair's drive that went almost in a straight line to left center field, in the seventh inning, was a particularly fine effort. Coke Grady went back of second base on the grass to throw out Forbes Kennedy in the eighth inning for another brilliant play, committing only one error, while the Pontiacs had two. Charlie Ryan was plate umpire, and Hank Landry and Elmer Phillips looked after the bases.

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Dodgers & Cards Lose 2; Braves Win Twin Bill

Milwaukee's pennant-hungry Braves clobbered the Chicago Cubs 23-10, on a 26-hit attack in the first game Monday and came back to sweep the doubleheader, 4-0, behind the three-hit pitching of righthander Bob Trowbridge.

The double victory upped Milwaukee's lead to 8½ games over second-place St. Louis and nine games over third-place Brooklyn Cardinals in both games at New York, 11-5 and 4-3; and the Phillies took two from the Dodgers at Brooklyn, 9-4 and 7-4.

In the American League, the lowly Orioles trimmed the vaunted New York Yankees twice at Baltimore, 8-7 and 6-1; Cleveland took both ends of a doubleheader with the Kansas City Athletics 8-0 and 5-3; the Red Sox twice downed the Washington Senators at Boston, 7-1 and 8-7, and at Detroit, the Tigers edged the Chicago White Sox 5-4 after dropping the opener to southpaw Billy Pierce, 8-2.

STRIKES OUT NINE

In the National at Chicago, Trowbridge turning in his second complete game in 13 starts and his first victory since July 23, struck out nine and walked one.

He was clipped for a third inning leadoff double by Cal Neenan, an infield single by Walt Moryn in the fourth and Bob Speake's ninth inning double in posting his fifth victory against four defeats.

The Braves scored a pair of unearned runs in the third and added two more on Wes Covington's eighth inning triple. Covington had a total of eight runs batted in for the day.

The Braves' runs had his total in the first game were high for one team in the majors this season and the combined 33 runs and 40 hits by both teams also were tops.

Hank Aaron and Covington each sent home six runs to match the National League high for runs batted in for the year.

Covington sent home three runs with his 17th homer in the third inning and Eddie Mathews hit his 29th with one on in the ninth.

The Chicago attack, which included 14 hits, was led by Ernie Banks who drove in four runs with a single and his 31st and 32nd homers.

At Brooklyn the Phillies rocked five Brooklyn pitchers for 31 hits. It all but eliminated any chance the fading champions had to catch the high-flying Braves.

Granny Hamner and Ed Bouchee led the onslaught which enabled Warren Hacker to register his seventh victory and Jim Hearn his fifth. Hamner drove in six runs, four in the first game when he collected two singles and a triple. Bouchee raised his batting average to .299, highest on the club, with five singles in eight official times at bat.

The twin victories, which assured the Phillies of retaining fourth place, were the fifth and sixth in seven games at Ebbets Field and boosted their season edge over the Dodgers to eight-and-a-half.

SAUER COMES ALIVE
At New York, Hammerin' Hank Sauer blasted home six runs in the opener and southpaw Johnny Antonelli, who had lost three in a row, smacked a two-run homer the sixth that settled the nightcap as the Giants swept the doubleheader from the Pirates.

Sauer the 38-year-old outfielder cut loose by the St. Louis Cardinals last season, was 3-for-3 in the first game with his seventh home run leading off the nightcap as the Giants swept the doubleheader from the Pirates.

The old guy was 1-for-2 in the nightcap as the Pirates came from behind in a pitching and batting battle between Antonelli and Johnny O'Brien.

Willie Mays gave the Giants a 2-0 lead in the nightcap third with his 30th home run.

At Cincinnati, against the Cardinals, the Reds knocked out three homers in the free-hitting opener, the nightcap went 10 innings before Frankie Robinson, last year's rookie of the year, banged a two-run homer.

Robinson's homer busted a 1-1 tie that lasted from the second inning.

IS PITCHERS' DUEL
The nightcap had quickly evolved into a duel between Redleg

southpaw Don Gross and righthander Larry Jackson.

Gross, third Redleg hurler in as many games to go all the way, struck out five Cardinals and walked only one.

The Reds lost little time teaching Cardinal starter Von McDaniel in the opener, chasing him in the second after Cincinnati got a firm start on its first five runs.

But his successors, Willieard Schmidt and Hoyt Wilhelm, fared little better as the Reds banged out a total of 14 hits.

The Cardinals managed to extract 13 hits, but Redleg Hal Jeffcoat, who went all the way for the Reds, kept the trouble spots scattered.

Bob Thurman, Ed Balley and George Crowe each belted a homer for Cincinnati, but the Cards' Ken Boyer and Irv Noren smacked one apiece.

3 TIGERS HOMER
At Detroit in the American, home runs by Al Kaline, Harvey Kuenn and Reno Bertoia swept the Detroit Tigers to a 5-4 triumph over Chicago in the second game after southpaw Billy Pierce registered his 18th victory in Chicago's 8-2 opening-game triumph.

The second-place White Sox lost a chance to gain valuable ground on the league-leading New York Yankees, who dropped a doubleheader to the Orioles.

Kalene swatted his 20th home run after a pair of singles in the first inning. Kuenn hit his eighth homer in leading off the second inning and Bertoia hit his fourth with no one aboard two innings later.

Frank Lary won his first straight in the second contest that was delayed 38 minutes by rain at the start of the seventh inning.

At Baltimore, the Yankees were dumped for their first doubleheader loss by the Orioles who beat them 8-7 in 11 innings after trailing by six runs and 6-1 behind Connie Johnson's 14-strikeout pitching.

The bat of 35-year-old George Kell sparked in both games for the Orioles. The third baseman drove in half of the Oriole runs in each victory in the course of hitting safely six times out of nine.

Mickey Mantle's batting average dropped four points to .373 as he hit safely only once out of six tries in the first game and struck out as a pinchhitter to end the second game.

WILLIAMS ON TOP
Mantle was forced to give back the league batting leadership to Ted Williams of Boston who

didn't play Monday and slaved at 376.

At Boston, Frank Sullivan hit clutch pitching in the opener, and clutch nightcap relief by George Susce provided Boston with the sweep over Washington.

Home runs by Sammy White and Jim Piersall brought the Sox from behind in the eighth inning of the second game.

Sullivan got his 12th victory in the opener while beating Red Sox Jim Pedro Ramos. It was only the fifth time in 16 decisions Boston has defeated the Senator righthander.

GARCIA GETS FIVE
In the Cleveland game, Cleveland won both games of its final home double header beating Kansas City 8-0 on Mike Garcia's five-hit shutout, his first of the season, then taking the nightcap 6-3 on home runs by relief pitcher Cal McLish and Vic Wertz.

Three of the five hits Garcia allowed were singles by Woody Held, and only one Kansas City runner reached second base.

In the nightcap, Wertz's 23rd home run in the second inning, an unearned tally in the third and McLish's homer after an error and a walk in the fourth put the Indians back on top 5-3 and they added their last run in the eighth off veteran Virgil Trucks on singles by Roger Maris, Chae Carrasquel and Larry Rames.

Ralph Terry was charged with the loss.

McLish was the winner.
