STAYED FROM THEIR SHIPS.—Two fishermen who strayed away from their vessel loaded in Capin Cove, Cape Breton, last Wednesday night, having been five days and nights in their dory without food or water. They suffered terribly from hunger, thirst and exhaustion. The next night another dory containing four other men landed at Larocheveque, C. B., also in a very exhausted condition. The names of the men and of the vessel from which they strayed are not given. THEY WERE MADE HAPPY.—A country newspaper in Pennsylvania prints the following list of wedding presents at a rural wedding in its parish: From father and mother of the bride, one Jersey calf; from bride to groom, one hair wreath made from hair of the entire family, and also six white shirts; from brother Elias, one book of poems, one dream book, one polite letter writer, and one dog; from sister Harriet, six hens and a rooster, also a jar of tomato catsup; from cousin Sarah, one poem made by herself on the bride and bridegroom—15 verses in all. AMMUNITION STOLEN.—There have been extensive robberies of ammunition at the drill shed, Halifax. The building has not been repaired since the fire, a couple of years ago, and the arms and ammunition in the armory have been easily accessible to all. On Tuesday night when serving out ammunition it was discovered by the caretaker that a box containing one thousand rounds had been stolen from the 63rd armory, and from the 66th armory several thousand rounds have been taken. There is no clue. THE MARKET.—The attendance at the market to-day was small, with a slight change in prices. Butter (fresh), in fair supply, sold at from 17 to 20 cents per lb.; butter (tub) at from 17 to 19 cents per lb. Eggs, in small supply, sold at from 11 to 12 cents per dozen. They were in fair supply, selling at from 70 to 75 cents per cwt. Oats, in poor supply, sold at from 34 to 35 cents per bushel. Potatoes in good supply, were slowly bought up at from 32 to 33 cents per bushel. Lobsters were in large supply and sold at from 3 to 8 cents each. Fish (fresh) were selling at from 8 to 10 cents per dozen. Cod were in good supply and sold from 6 cents up. MORE CHANGES! Three Ocean Flyers.

Three fast steamships are now on their way across the ocean, bound to New York, and much interest is felt in the result of their efforts to win fresh laurels. Their arrival is looked forward to by steamship men with considerable interest, for it is expected that something remarkable in the way of Atlantic voyages will be done. Each vessel has distinguished herself by making records. The vessels are the new big Cunard Campania, that surprised everyone by her speed on her last trip to New York; the Paris, of the American line, which holds the record of five days, 14 hours and 24 minutes from Queenstown to New York; and the Forst Bismarck of the Hamburg-American line, which holds the record of 6 days, 11 hours and 44 minutes from Southampton to New York. The Paris left Southampton at 12 o'clock (Greenwich time) on Thursday, and will no doubt try to beat the record.

Mr. Fisher, of Pictou, leaves here on Monday, 29th, for Chicago, as the representative of the Grand Division S. of T. of P. E. I. to the National Division which meets at Chicago June 1. Mr. Fisher is also M. W. Chaplain of the National Division, and preaches the official sermon before that body June 4. The World's Congress of Temperance Workers opens its session at the same place June 5, and Mr. Fisher is the island's representative to this meeting also. The congregation of the Main street Baptist Church have been in correspondence with Rev. A. J. Gordon, of Charlottetown, with a view to secure him as their pastor. This request was backed by an unanimous call to the rev. gentleman. While no definite answer has been received from Mr. Gordon, he has signified his willingness—during his attendance at the Baptist conference in this city next month—to occupy the pulpit of Main street church on the first Sunday in June. This is regarded by some members of the church as a satisfactory reply.—St. John Telegraph.
