**COAL.**—The schrs. Nereid and Lorridon arrived yesterday at Summerside from Dom. Coal Co's Mines, C. B., with cargoes of Screened and Run-of-Mine coal for Peake Bros. & Co. The schrs. Minnie, Laura, Miletus and Samoa, arrived at Ch'town yesterday, with cargoes of Run-of-Mine coal for same firm.

**GET ONE.**—Every teacher on the Island will receive from R. K. Brace a roll of Patriotic Songs. Ten thousand have been published with popular tunes, hoping that the teachers will all know them and try to teach the scholars. It will lighten the burden of lessons, instil a spirit of patriotism and enable them most heartily to entertain visitors to the school.

**"PATRIOTIC SONGS."**—This is the title of a small pamphlet that has been given to the public by Mr. R. K. Brace. In it are several songs, sent to Mr. Brace by his son, Nelson, from South Africa. **PRESBYTERY.**—A meeting of Presbytery was held at Cavendish on Tuesday, 12th inst. The selection by the congregation of a site for a new church was sanctioned, and building recommended to begin at once. Presbytery agreed to co-operate with Cavendish congregation in celebrating the jubilee of Rev. Isaac Murray, D. D. A call from Dundas to Mr. Malcolm Buchanan was sustained.

**RUNAWAY.**—This morning a countryman's horse bolted from the south side of the market house, and ran along Victoria Row to Queen street. Turning up Queen the runaway locked the wagon with another standing at Sentner McLeod & Co's. Here it stayed while the horse ran on to the north market square where he was caught. The countryman's wagon was badly broken while the other was uninjured.

**DESTROYED BY FIRE.**—An esteemed correspondent at Glen Martin, for whose letter we regret that we have not space today, says: "A short time ago our district was threatened with ruin by that destructive element fire. Everything was in a high state of combustibility, a very strong breeze was blowing at the time and to start a fire under such circumstances was an act bordering on rashness. It destroyed a valuable grove of soft wood belonging to Mr. Ronald Nicholson and cleaned the property of Mr. Jonathan McLean from end to end; but it appears this is more of a gain than loss. Leaving these it turned its attention to Mr. Hugh McDonald and destroyed a grove worth three or four hundred dollars and left him entirely without a fence; in fact it was with difficulty Mr. McDonald's buildings were saved.
