What the Charlottetown Board of Trade Did at its Council Meeting Last Night

1. Accepted with regret resignation of M.A. Farmer as president, tendered in view of his recent election to the City Council.
2. Nominated vice-president E. M. Robinson as president for the balance of the Board year.
3. Nominated J. Gordon MacDonald as vice-president for the balance of the Board year.
4. Accepted with regret resignation of Frank J. Storey as a member of the Council in view of his recent election to the City Council.
5. Elected Frank A. MacKenzie as a member of the Council for the balance of the Board year.
6. Endorsed proposed trip to Ottawa by Mayor J. D. Stewart re proposed public works projects for this City.
7. Heard report from Committee on Get-Out-The-Vote campaign in connection with recent civic election.
8. Decided to drop Board membership in Canadian Industrial Preparedness Association.
9. Approved payment of annual dues to Maritime Provinces Board of Trade.
10. Received and discussed communication from Minister of National Defense re proposed Naval Barracks for this City.
11. Voted \$15,000 towards cost of Canadian Citizenship Council's proposed reception for new Canadians here and named A. W. Gaudet to represent Board on that body.
12. Tabled resolution from Souris Board of Trade seeking establishment of branch of National Employment Service there.
13. Discussed need of proper fire regulations for this City and named committee of F.W. Curtis, F. W. Hyndman, J.G. MacDonald and the secretary to prepare draft by-law in this regard for presentation to City Council.
14. Decided to again press City Council for new Peddlers' By-Law.
15. Decided to study question of need of proper building and heating code for this City and set up a committee to work on same.
16. Named committee of P. S. Cobb and E. C. Baker to assist

City Council in search for more appropriate site for City weigh scales.

17. Discussed proposed City purchase of vacant land between Kent and Grafton Streets and left same over for further study.
18. Decided to extend invitation to City Councillors to sit in ex officio on all Board Council meetings they care to, and to have two representatives of the Board at all future City Council meetings to show support and interest of the Board in City Council activities.
19. Decided to issue Press releases following Board Council meetings in future.
20. Decided to ask Brig. W. W. Reid to again chair a committee to sponsor Festive Week here this year.
21. Set down Tuesday, March 18th, for March regular monthly Board dinner meeting with guest speaker Dr. H. D. Smith, president of the Nova Scotia Research Foundation.

They were all acts to amend previously passed statutes, including the Game Act, Public Service Act, Bailable Proceedings Act, Bulk Sales Act, Conditional Sales Act, Court Costs Act, Judicature Act, Highway Traffic Act, Plant Disease Eradication Act, Interpretation Act, Probate Act, Trustee Act, Companies' Act, and Workmen's Compensation Act.
