# Borden Examination Feat Is Hailed As Outstanding

The Town of Borden yesterday was about ready to proclaim a holiday and the town fathers may well yet declare a special day to honour the teachers and pupils of its grade ten class who made such a splendid showing in the provincial grade ten examinations.

Out of 13 students who tried the examinations 10 of these passed. Four of the successful candidates were in class 1; two were in class II and the remainder in the pass list.

TOP TWO  
Out of this group two Borden students stood first and second for the whole Island. Arlyn Jane MacLeod had 723 out of 800 and Norma Ceretti had 708.

But the heroine in this whole happy picture is a 60-year old grandmother who returned to the teaching profession in 1952 after an absence of 25 years. One of her successful students was her grandchild who made over 80 per cent.

Mrs. Irene Easton recalls as a girl (formerly Irene Trowsdale) trying PWC entrance from

Prince Street School in Charlottetown. Her teacher, was the late J. D. Seaman. That was in the year 1914.

LOVES HER PUPILS  
Mrs. Easton, though of diminutive proportions—perhaps not as big as many of her pupils—credits her success to the fact—“I love every one of my pupils and I feel that every one of them loves me—There is nothing that I would not do for one of them and I believe they feel the same way toward me”, she said.

Mrs. Easton revealed yesterday that she not only teaches all of the subjects in grade ten but she teaches a similar number of subjects to grade nine. “I have never had to use a strap in all my teaching experience”, Mrs. Easton mused, “I believe complete trust in the pupils demands better discipline than strapping”.

Mrs. Easton says one thing she never marks her students' exams easy. “The marks they received in their finals at the end of the school year compared favorably with those they received in the provincial grade ten examinations”, she said.
