## BETHLEHEM STABLE HAS LESSON FOR ALL

A few years ago, Bishop Fulton Sheen in his Christmas sermon, spoke of Joseph and Mary and the infant Christ as "displaced persons." And for centuries, preachers have likened those of us without the proper dispositions to receive the grace of Christmas, to those innkeepers of Bethlehem who turned away Joseph and the Virgin.

With Canadians now in the midst of the most opulent Christmas preparations in their history, it is not amiss to consider our obligations to the New Canadians, to the individuals and families whom Divine Providence has led to find shelter in the inn which is Canada.

There are many reasons for welcoming these people of the old country to the new, and the sponsors and advertisers of the immigration program of our government have been quick to point out the cultural and economic value of such immigration. No one would deny that these people bring with them an appreciation and love of fine music, for example, which cannot help but enrich our cultural heritage.

Among them are found countless artisans in crafts unknown or long forgotten among us, artisans who will awaken, or re-awaken in us a love of the beautiful in man-made things, and a reverence for man as continuing God's work of creation. To a nation caught up, necessarily, in the rush of the assembly line and high-pressure salesmanship, and the attendant temptation to make size and speed the sole standards of value, they bring a slower tempo of life, a tempo which has time for afternoons in the Art Gallery or the Museum, for evenings of song and dancing.

## TWO VIEWPOINTS

They bring standards that place value on beauty and grace and tradition. On the economic level, the wave of immigration has increased the home market of Canadian products and made a substantial contribution to a booming Canadian prosperity.

But these considerations, while important for the welfare of Canada, are based on the value to us of this immigration; there are other considerations, more altruistic, which should determine

such a change, especially a change that is effected by those whose culture we do not understand, and hence do not appreciate. It is hard for some of us to see such a change being effected by members of some national group for which we feel a real antipathy.  
But if we can see human history as "the ordered march of the Providence of God," we shall suppress these hesitations. His Grace this Christmas, we should not forget that He has graces for our country as well. And surely one grace that He will not deny us is this: that we Canadians have a understanding hearts in accepting with genuine selfless charity and with confident joy, the new members whom He is sending to our Canadian family.
